TAKE STEPS NOW TO BE PREPARED Pets Require Planning Too



HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS – A Continuing Series

If you have pets, a **Pet Survival Kit** should be a part of your preparedness plan. The kit should include enough food, kitty litter and bottled water for two weeks, extra leashes and collars, and cleaning supplies and puppy training pads in case your dog cannot go outside due to severe weather. In addition, your kit should have copies of your pet's rabies certificate and Broward County license, as the license is the easiest way someone can identify your pet if it gets lost.

Pet Friendly Shelter: Millenium Middle School in Tamarac is the only county shelter that will accept pets. Residents must <u>pre-register</u> with the Humane Society of Broward County by calling 954-989-3977. Pets must be current with their rabies vaccination and licensed, and you must remain with and care for your pet. *Qualified service animals are allowed at all shelters*.

Top Tips - your pets are depending on you!

- <u>License & Vaccinations</u>: Make sure your pet has all of its proper vaccinations and Broward County pet license. The law requires that all dogs and cats have a current rabies vaccination and a county pet license (http://www.broward.org/animal). NOTE: Shelters, kennels, and hotels will not accept your pet without proper documentation.
- <u>ID on Pet</u>: Keep current identification on your pet (this includes indoor cats). A County license, name tag, microchip or tattoo, are all ways your pet can be identified if it becomes lost.
- <u>Food & Water</u>: Keep an adequate supply of food and water (2 week's supply recommended).
- <u>Medications</u>: If your pet is on medication, make sure you have an adequate supply on hand.
- Records: Have a copy of all of your animal's documents and medical records in a sealable plastic bag so they don't get wet or destroyed.
- <u>Photo:</u> Take a picture of you and your pet together (*this helps prove the pet is yours*). Also, take a picture of your pet by itself. Be sure to photograph any distinguishing marks that will help with identification.
- <u>Sanitation</u>: For dogs, set aside an area of the house so the dog can go to the bathroom when the weather becomes too severe to go outside. Have cleaning products and puppy training pads or newspapers. Have litter and litter box for cats; and bedding materials for other pets. Fish tanks can be fitted with an adaptor for battery power.
- For dog and cat owners, you must stay with your pet. Abandonment is against the law!






If you see an alligator nearby, stay calm. Feeding, harassing, or killing alligators violate State law, so just leave them alone. If an alligator appears threatening, comes close to your home, or becomes a risk for humans or pets, contact the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) at (561) 357-4200. Only nuisance alligators can be removed and the FWC will make that determination and contact a licensed trapper. Generally, alligators may be considered a nuisance when they are at least four feet in length and pose a threat to people or their pets or property.

The City is not permitted to handle alligators for any reason. So give a little extra attention to your surroundings when you and your family are spending time near the water, but continue to enjoy the uniqueness of our environment.

Rainy Season Ahead: Stormwater and You Prevent Street Flooding

Weston's water bodies and canals were designed to hold and move stormwater. Stormwater is excess rain runoff that is removed from our properties and streets by

going down into catch basins and prevents flooding.

A catch basin is a part of a storm drain or sewer system which is designed to trap debris so that it cannot enter the drainage pipes. Catch basins are a large scale version of the traps used in home drains to accomplish a similar function. Unobstructed water flow through these drains and water bodies, especially during storm events, is essential to prevent flooding.



WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP -

- Keep catch basins free of trash, debris or other obstructions. NEVER discard paint, oil or other hazardous waste into the storm drains (this is illegal) and NEVER remove the grate this protects people and pets from falling into the drain and keeps large amounts of debris out of the system which would increase the chance of flooding.
- Maintain swale areas in good condition. Don't change the shape of swales or obstruct the path of water flow.
- Do not be alarmed if swales hold water for 24-36 hours. They are designed to hold water and filter it through into the ground. Mosquitoes do not breed until water ponds for over 72 hours.
- Don't deposit yard waste, grass clippings or debris in waterways, and do not sweep into catch basins.
- Prune tree branches and shrubs that hang out over any waterways.
- Avoid fertilizing your lawn before a storm. *You lose twice*: the fertilizer is washed away, and it washes into the water bodies.





FLOODING WITHIN HOMEOWNER ASSOCIATION MAINTAINED PROPERTIES (HOA's)

Roadways and their drainage systems within private communities are owned and maintained by the community's maintenance association, not the City of Weston.

Response to and mitigation of flooding that occurs within these private communities is the responsibility of the community's management company.

In the event that flooding is so severe that a structure may be compromised, property owners may call the City's Department of Public Works. They will investigate the situation and determine if the cause of the flooding is the community's drainage system or the City's storm water management system, and take the appropriate action if any is needed.

The City does not perform work on privately-owned drainage systems, so you are encouraged to **contact your HOA** if your street tends to flood regularly (yet the catch basin is clear) as the drain may need to be cleared professionally.


ONLINE COMMUNITY CLASS REGISTRATION IS NOW AVAILABLE
