



STOVE TOP COOKING SENDS TWO CHILDREN TO HOSPITAL

In the second serious home fire since January, on March 5th, two children, ages 10 and 12 years of age, were victims of smoke inhalation and thankfully, only minor burns. The children had been cooking with a pot on the stove inside their townhome when the grease in the pot flared up. The children attempted to put out the grease fire with water – a serious *mistake. Weston fire crews arrived to find the entire home filled with smoke and the children in need of medical attention.

Last year, two Weston homes were seriously damaged due to kitchen fires which resulted from pots being unattended while cooking on the stove.

Advice to Parents and Homeowners from Weston Fire Chief Harris Bouchillon:

The kitchen can be the most hazardous room in the house without safety practices

Cooking is the leading cause of residential fires and fire injuries in the United States

Young children are at a higher risk of being burned by hot food and liquids. Keep children away from cooking areas by enforcing a "child-free zone" of three feet around the stove and microwave.

When cooking with young children present, use the stove's back burners whenever possible and never hold a child while cooking, drinking or carrying hot foods or liquids. Keep hot foods and liquids away from table and counter edges.





Combating fire related injuries and death is a team effort. As a parent, you play a key role in protecting your children from the dangers of fire. Invest in the wellbeing of your family by taking the time to teach your children about fire safety. Installing smoke alarms and preparing and practicing your personal escape plan can be made into a fun exercise with your children.

And don't forget, we are here to help you! If you would like our fire fighters to review your personal escape plan please let us know. Bring your children by any of our fire stations and we will be more than happy to show them our fire apparatus and review fire safety information with them. Whether you are a parent, a teacher, a clergy member, or a staff member at a recreational facility, I urge you to join us in sharing fire safety information with our children. * Grease Fires Grease fires happen when collections of oil or grease on a stove, oven or fryer get hot enough to ignite. Grease fires are extremely dangerous because the fuel source (the grease) is a liquid, and easily splashed. Grease fire burn very hot and can quickly spread to cabinets or other flammable areas of the kitchen.

The most important thing you can do to prevent a fire in the kitchen is to stay put. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home cooking fires. Stay by the stove and be prepared for flames.

Time Required: You only have a few moments to either put out a grease fire or escape the house.

- 1. **DO NOT USE WATER ON A GREASE FIRE!** Start evacuating everyone from the building. Fires spread extremely fast and can overwhelm victims in minutes. **Treat burns** only after evacuating the building.
- 2. <u>Call 911</u>. There's no reason to wait, and the fire department can always go back to the station if you are able to get the fire out without help.
- 3. The easiest way to smother a grease fire is to cover it with a pan lid. Be careful with glass lids; they can break from the extreme heat of open flame.
- 4. Grease fires can also be smothered with baking soda, but it takes a lot of baking soda to do the trick. Unless the baking soda is easily accessible, it's usually easier to quickly find a lid.
- 5. A dry chemical <u>fire extinguisher</u> will also work, but it will contaminate your kitchen and food. Class K fire extinguishers are available to put out grease and other kitchen fires, but they are usually only found in commercial kitchens.

Information of Interest about Driver Licenses and Identification Cards

Other News on Teen Driving, Biking Safety and More

BRING ALL YOU NEED, PLEASE: Florida residents wishing to obtain a new driver license or identification card, legally change their name prior to their renewal date, or immediately replace a lost or stolen license or ID card, must go prepared with the proper documentation. The time you will spend completing your transaction on the first visit is directly related to providing the required proper documentation. The complete list of acceptable documents is available online at www.GatherGoGet.com. Here is a summary of the requirements:

- 1) <u>Identification</u> A certified U.S. birth certificate; a valid U.S. passport; a consular Report of Birth Abroad; a certificate of Naturalization (Form N-550 or N-570); or a certificate of Citizenship (Form N-560 or N-561).
- 2) Social Security Number Card, W-2 form, any 1099 form or paycheck stub.
- 3) <u>Residential Address</u> Two (2) items mailed to you that contain your address. Acceptable is a mortgage statement, voter ID card, a utility bill or a car insurance policy, among many others.

Anyone who has changed their name must bring marriage certificates, court orders or divorce decrees to connect the name on the primary identification to the name of the customer and the name in which the license or ID card will be issued.

U.S. citizens, permanent residents, immigrants and non-immigrants can secure a complete list of documents to bring to one of our offices by visiting www.GatherGoGet.com, or www.ReunaVengaObtenga.com in Spanish, or www.RasanbleAlePran.com in Creole.

MAKE AN APPOINTMENT!: all customers who must visit one of our offices to renew, replace or file a change of address to their driver license or identification card are urged to secure an appointment prior to their visit. Connect via Internet at http://www.flhsmv.gov/oasis for an appointment to greatly reduce the length of the visit. Then link to the on-line pre-application and complete it before going to an office.

IMPROVING DRIVER LICENSE EQUIPMENT:

The project will replace aging technology and equipment used to issue Florida driver license and identification cards and as a result will reduce the amount of time it takes to process an issuance request and significantly improve system down times.

REDUCE THE RISKS OF BICYCLING: Florida's high fatality rate demands a concerted effort to improve safety. Florida suffers more cycling fatalities than almost anywhere in the nation: poor visibility, lack of driver awareness, and a preponderance of high speed traffic arteries without bike lanes. The causes are varied, but the high number is alarming. We all need to make two-wheeled transportation safer.





Here are some recommendations:



- The "share the road" public awareness campaign needs to become much more noticeable. Too many drivers ignore laws related to bike safety, such as the requirement that cyclists be given 3-foot clearance when passing. With astounding frequency, drivers roll through stop signs and traffic lights without checking first for oncoming cyclists and pedestrians.
- Better lighting on bikes and also on key commuting routes should have a high priority. Local communities are making progress in this regard, but bicyclists still face too many long, inadequately lighted stretches of roadway and sidewalk. Cyclists commuting to schools, jobs and public parks need safe, well designed and illuminated bike routes.
- Everyone sharing the roadways should ride or drive defensively, eliminate distractions (such as cell phones or iPods), obey traffic rules, stay sober and look both directions before heading into traffic. This goes for drivers and for cyclists, who are sometimes their own worst enemy riding against traffic, riding at night on unlighted bikes, carrying friends on the handlebars or crossing busy highways against the signal. National statistics indicate these behaviors contribute significantly to bicycle fatality rates.
- Encourage the use of reflective and LED bike gear, and promote helmets.

A helmet, "is the single most effective way to prevent head injury resulting from a bicycle crash," according to the 2008 "Traffic Safety Facts" put out by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The public benefit of cycling is substantial: It reduces traffic congestion and pollution; it is a much more affordable means of transportation than driving; it provides the health benefits of exercise; and it offers mobility to people who don't have a driver's license. These advantages mean little, however, if cycling isn't safe.

The "share the road" message, reminding drivers of the presence of cyclists, needs to be a top-of mind priority for all. Drivers and cyclists both stand to benefit from peaceful coexistence.


