BROWARD SHERIFF'S OFFICE SPLASH INITIATIVE IS RAISING DROWNING AWARENESS

Children are naturally drawn to water. In Florida, drowning is the leading cause of death for children under the age of four. According to the Broward County Medical Examiner, more children in our area drown in backyard pools than in the ocean.

In an effort to raise awareness and reinforce our efforts to stop these entirely preventable tragedies the Broward Sheriff's Office has developed the "SPLASH" initiative, which stands for Supervise, Protection, Lessons, Alarms, Search, Help.



The program, which is specifically designed by first responders, educates families to:

- Always supervise children around any body of water keeping children within touching distance.
- Utilize layers of protection including fences with self-closing gates, locks on gates and doors and pool covers.
- Children need swim lessons as soon as they are able to crawl.
- All doors leading to any body of water should have an audible alarm to indicate when they are being opened.
- Any time a child is missing, immediately search all bodies of water first. Do not scan, thoroughly look.
- Call for help by dialing 911 immediately, every second counts so use the phone while checking bodies of water.

TEMPORARY AIR TRAFFIC PATTERN CHANGES

Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport

Residents may notice additional air traffic over the city but this is temporary.

North Runway Closure

The Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport's North Runway is closed **through Thursday**, **July 7**, **2011 for up to 65 days**. Workers are completing a number of critical construction projects and installing several safety enhancement features. During the construction, departing and arriving flights will use the Diagonal Runway. Work began on Tuesday, May 3rd.



How will the flight patterns change?

With flights using the North Runway, a majority of flights now arrive from the west to land and they depart to the east over the ocean. With flights using the Diagonal Runway, flights will generally arrive from the northwest to land and depart to the southeast over the ocean.

What type of work will contractors perform on the North Runway?

The project consists of five main elements:
Constructing two high speed runway exits
Widening of Taxiways A and B at the east end of the north runway
Widening of an existing high speed runway exit
Installing Runway Status Lights
Relocating Runway Navigational Aids





Other News:

FLL is implementing another easy and convenient way to pay for airport parking. Beginning in late May, travelers will be able to use their Sun Pass transponder in airport parking garages. Here's how it works:

- You must set up your Sun Pass account with auto replenish.
- When you arrive at the airport, follow the signage to parking.
- Choose the Sun Pass lane when you enter and when you leave.
- The charge will be deducted from your Sun Pass account automatically.

NAVIGATING A ROUNDABOUT

Roundabouts are constructed to slow traffic and make roadways safer for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists. With the city's newest roundabout (Bonaventure Blvd. & Saddle Club Road) near completion here's a reminder of the protocols and traffic laws regarding the use of a roundabout.

Vehicles

1. Yield at Entry

As you approach the roundabout there will be a yield sign and dashed yield limit line. Slow down, watch for pedestrians and bicyclists, and be prepared to stop if necessary. Yield to circulating traffic on the left, but do not stop if the way is clear.

2. Slow Down

Drive at a slow speed through the roundabout. The posted speed limit in the roundabout is 15 mph.

3. Yield to Pedestrians

Pedestrians have the right of way as in any other marked crosswalk.

4. Yield to Bicycles

Bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as motorists when riding in the roundabout.

Do not turn in front of or "cut off" a bicycle when exiting the roundabout.

5. Yield to Emergency Vehicles

Pull over **after** exiting the roundabout. Do not stop while still inside the roundabout.

Pedestrians

1. Use Roundabout Crosswalks

Walk around the perimeter of the roundabout, using the crosswalks.

Do not cross the roadway to the central island.

2. Watch for Traffic

Look and listen for approaching vehicle traffic and bicycle traffic.

Choose a safe time to cross. Try to make eye contact with approaching drivers.

Bicycles

1. Ride with Traffic

While roundabouts don't have striped bike lanes, traffic moves slowly, allowing cyclists and motorists to more effectively share space. Merge into the appropriate travel lane as you approach the roundabout. proceed through the roundabout, and merge back onto the shoulder after exiting the roundabout.

2. Share Sidewalk with Walkers

The roundabout has a wide sidewalk for cyclists and pedestrians to share. Cyclists must yield to pedestrians on the sidewalk.

PUBLIC HEARINGS FOR UPCOMING I-75 PROJECTS



Two public hearings are being held for Interstate-75 as part of the Project Development and Environmental Study. These public hearings will be conducted to afford interested persons the opportunity to express their views concerning the location, conceptual design, social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed improvements. The project extends from the SR-826/Palmetto Expressway in Miami-Dade County to I-595 in Broward County. Public participation is solicited without regard to race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, disability or family status.

The alternatives in this project will include the possible addition of special use lanes, auxiliary lanes, and interchange improvements along the I-75 in Miami-Dade and Broward Counties. These improvements are needed to address future growth and development projected in the region, enhance hurricane and other emergency evacuation, and improve system connectivity between I-75, State-Road 826 (Palmetto Expressway), Gratigny Parkway, Florida's Turnpike, I-595 and the Sawgrass Expressway.
