Weston's Law Enforcement Explorer Program Post 44 recently competed in the 6th Annual Learning for Life Regional Competition. This was Post 44's first time in the competition and they proudly won the 2nd place trophy on the "In Progress" burglary scenario. There were a total of 17 teams in the competition, including 5 from Broward Sheriff's Office with approximately 200 Explorers in attendance.

The group was lead by Deputy Kevin Maccagli and is based out of Tequesta Trace Middle School in Weston. The members of the winning team that participated in the competition and trainings were: Mike Carabine, Jonathan Nudleman, Nick Batista, Victor Yepez, Jacob Torner and Alejo Belzrez, and the team alternates were Sara Evans and Brian Goldberg.





The Explorers program works with teens and young adults (14-21 years of age) by allowing them to interact with law enforcement and other community advisors in a serious, regimented atmosphere where the students can demonstrate their personal initiative. The program offers young adults the opportunity to learn and experience lawful citizenship as they participate, side-by-side with certified BSO deputies in ongoing training and community service projects.



NATIONAL PREPARDNESS MONTH You Can Be the Hero

September is National Preparedness Month.

Now is a time to prepare yourself and those in your care for emergencies and disasters. If you've seen the news recently, you know that emergencies can happen unexpectedly in communities just like yours, to people like you. We've seen tornado outbreaks, river floods and flash floods, historic earthquakes, tsunamis, and even water main breaks and power outages in U.S. cities affecting millions of people for days at a time.

Police, fire and rescue may not always be able to reach quickly in an emergency or disaster. The most important step you can take in helping you local responders is being able to take care of yourself and those in you care; the more people prepared, the quicker the community will recover.





- ✓ Stay Informed: Information is available from federal, state, local, tribal resources to learn what to do before, during, and after an emergency.
- ✓ Make a Plan: Discuss, agree on, and document an emergency plan with those
 you care about.
- ✓ **Build a Kit**: Keep enough emergency supplies- water, nonperishable food, first aid, prescriptions, flashlight, and battery-powered radio on hand.
- ✓ Get Involved: The whole community can participate in programs and activities to make their families, homes and places of worship safer from risks and threats.

TAKE STEPS NOW TO BE PREPARED

GENERATOR SAFETY

HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS – A Continuing Series

Generators are useful when temporary or remote electric power is needed, but they also can be extremely dangerous. Hazards include carbon monoxide poisoning from toxic engine exhaust, electric shock, electrocution, and fire.



Heed these important safety tips:

- When installing a permanent generator, be sure to obtain the necessary permits and have a licensed electrician do the installation.
- Use the generator according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Place portable generators outside in a well-ventilated area, NEVER inside a home including garages, basements or crawl spaces.
- You cannot see or smell carbon monoxide. If you start to feel sick, dizzy or weak while using a generator, get outside to fresh air immediately and call 9-1-1.
- Install battery-operated or plug-in carbon monoxide alarms with battery back-up in your home.
- Do not refuel a generator while it is running.
- Do not store fuel indoors.
- Do not connect a portable generator directly to your house because the power you generate may flow back into power lines and cause damage or injure power workers.

RIGHT ON RED IS RIGHT BUT ONLY IF YOU FOLLOW THE RULES



You can turn right at most red lights in the state of Florida, unless otherwise indicated by a traffic sign or police officer. Use caution and follow the rules to avoid accidents with pedestrians, bikes or other vehicles.



Make A Complete Stop

You must come to a complete stop behind the white stop line at a red light, before you can turn right.

Count to five once you stop to avoid being photographed by an automatic traffic camera at some intersections in Florida, because you could be fined approximately \$204, warns the Florida DHSMV.

Yield To Pedestrians

Stop your vehicle **before the crosswalk** so pedestrians are able to cross the street in either direction, before you turn right at a red light. Allow them to finish crossing even if the light has turned red for them, or if there is no crosswalk.

Yield To Vehicles Making U-turns

Allow vehicles making a U-turn into the direction you want to turn right into, to go first, if you are facing a red light. Keep in mind that they have the right of way as their light is green.

Yield To All Traffic That Has Green Light

Give oncoming traffic going through a green light the right of way before you turn right on red. Watch out for vehicles turning left on a green arrow into your planned direction, as well as vehicles coming straight through a green light.

FLORIDA'S 5TH ANNIVERSARY Silver Alert

The month of October marks the 5th Anniversary that Florida's Governor put into place the executive order that helped establish the State's Silver Alert program.

The Silver Alert program is a public notification system that helps authorities find seniors who are missing and are believed to be in danger because of dementia or other cognitive impairment. The Silver Alert distributes information to the public in order to assist rescuers by the means of radio, TV, satellite radio, e-mail, electronic traffic signs, LED billboards, as well as SMS text messaging.

Program officials say nearly 700 missing seniors have been recovered under Silver Alert since its 2008 inception, as of July 2013. The public can play an important role in the rescue of missing elderly persons. One way to do this is to be on the lookout for the missing person or their vehicle when a Silver Alert is activated in your area.

Another way the public can assist is by being aware of those around you and



recognizing when a senior is in need of assistance. If you come into contact with a senior who appears lost or disoriented, and you have reason to believe that person will not be able to find their way home, you may be able to help prevent a Silver Alert by contacting law enforcement or, in the case of a family member, friend or neighbor, aiding the person in finding their way home.



Thirty-one states have similar programs, including Tennessee (which also uses the Silver Alert name) and Georgia (whose "Mattie's Call" program was established in 2006, named after an Alzheimer's disease patient who went missing from her Atlanta home two years earlier.)

BACK TO SCHOOL TIPS WHAT PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT BULLYING

Bullying among children is aggressive behavior that is intentional and involves an imbalance of power or strength. Usually bullying is repeated over time. Bullying can take many forms such as physical, verbal, emotional and cyber bullying.

Broward County School's Anti-Bullying Policy

The Broward County School District has an Anti-Bullying Policy that prohibits bullying of or by any district student or employee. It is important that parents become familiar with the policy. What to do if you suspect your child is being bullied

Talk with your child. Be supportive and gather information about the bullying. Report suspected bullying to your child's school. Anonymous reports can also occur by calling the school district's **emergency hotline at 754-321-0911**.



What parents should know about cyber bullying

Cyber bullying occurs when children or teens use the internet, cell phones or other devices to send or post text or images intended to hurt or embarrass other children or teens. This can include sending mean, vulgar, or threatening messages or images; posting sensitive, private information about another person; or pretending to be someone else in order to make that person look bad. Children and

teens can cyber bully each other through e-mails, instant messaging, text messages, web pages, blogs or chat rooms.

Tips to help prevent cyber bullying:

- keep your computer in easily viewable places
- talk regularly with your child about on-line activities that he or she is involved in
- tell your child that you may review their on-line communications
- consider installing parental control filtering software and/or tracking programs

Tips for dealing with cyber bullying that your child has experienced:

- strongly encourage your child not to respond to the cyber bullying
- do not erase the messages or pictures (save these as evidence)
- try to identify the individual doing the cyber bullying
- contact the police if cyber bullying involves acts such as threats of violence, extortion, obscene or harassing phone calls or text messages, harassment, stalking, hate crimes, etc.
