

DID YOU KNOW...? THE HISTORY OF WESTON'S DEVELOPMENT



Pre-1995 - Weston Entry

The 15,000 acres of land now comprising the City of Weston was first amassed in the 1950's by a gentleman named Arthur Vining Davis, the original owner of Weston's primary developer, ARVIDA.

Over the course of the ensuing years, plans were prepared as to how the land would developed and how that development would be financed, and the area now known as Bonaventure was sold to be developed separately.

Weston's History

The name of the Arvida development was changed from Indian Trace to Weston, and in 1984 the first homes were completed in Windmill Ranch and Country Isles, and Weston had its first residents.

Seeing Weston develop into what was appearing to be a self-sustainable community, the Board of Supervisors initiated an Incorporation Feasibility Study in April 1994 to determine if Weston should incorporate as a city, annex to a neighboring city, or remain as a part of unincorporated Broward County.

By November 1995 the Steering Committee and the Board of Supervisors arrived at the conclusion that the residents of Weston would be best served by forming a new city.

On September 3, 1996 the residents of the Indian Trace Community Development district went to the polls, and of those voting, 90% voted in favor of incorporation. The City of Weston was born.

The Bonaventure community was afforded the opportunity to vote on April 1, 1997 whether to become a part of the City of Weston, or the City of Sunrise, the result of which was to join Weston by an almost two to one margin.

Today Weston encompasses approximately 27 square miles with a population of 65,672.

During this week, NOAA and FEMA are highlighting the importance of planning and practicing how and where to take shelter before severe weather strikes. Being prepared to act quickly can be a matter of life and death.

Two keys to weather safety are to **prepare** for the risks and to **act** on those preparations when alerted by emergency officials.



Plan & Take Action

Everyone needs to be prepared for the unexpected. Your friends and family may not be together when disaster strikes. How will you find each other? Will you know if your children or parents are safe? You may have to evacuate or be confined to your home. What will you do if water, gas, electricity or phone services are shut off?

Supplies Kit

Put together a <u>basic disaster supplies kit</u> and consider <u>storage locations for different</u> situations.

Emergency Plans

Develop and document plans for your specific risks.

- Protect yourself and family with a Family Emergency Plan.
- Be sure to <u>plan for locations away from home</u>.
- Make sure schools and daycares have <u>School</u> <u>Emergency Plans</u>.
- Pet owners should have <u>plans to care for their animals</u>. The Centers for Disease Control & Prevention offer information on <u>animal health impacts in evacuation shelters</u>.

MEMORIAL DAY HISTORY AND TRADITIONS

Weston City Administrative Offices Closed on

Monday, May 25th

Memorial Day is a United States federal holiday that is observed on the last Monday of May. It was formerly known as **Decoration Day**. This holiday commemorates U.S. men and women who have died in military service to their country. It began first to honor Union soldiers who died during the American Civil War. After World War I, it was expanded to include those who died in any war or military action.

Many people observe this holiday by visiting cemeteries and memorials. A national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time. One tradition is to fly the U.S. flag at half-staff from dawn until noon local time. Volunteers place a U.S. flag upon each gravesite located in a National Cemetery.

In addition to remembrance, Memorial Day is also a time for picnics, family gatherings, and sporting events. Some Americans view Memorial Day as the unofficial beginning of summer and Labor Day as the unofficial end of the season.

Please note that the City Administration Offices will be closed in observance of the holiday. All City Parks will be open and there will be regular garbage collection.

REMINDER TO RESIDENTS: SORT NO MORE! "All-in-One" Recycling Without Sorting



Sorting and separating recyclable paper from recyclable plastic bottles, metal cans and glass bottles & jars is a thing of the past...

The "All-In-One" single-stream system allows recyclables to all be placed together in the same container.

By recycling we conserve natural resources, save energy and reduce pollution. We also reduce our need for fossil fuels, and lower greenhouse gas emissions.

Items That Can Be Mixed Together:

- Newspapers, inserts, catalogs, magazines, junk mail, office paper, soft-covered books, file folders, soda cartons, and crushed boxes, including tissue boxes and those from such food items as cereal, rice and pasta
- Flattened cardboard from non-food items such as shipping boxes
- Aluminum and steel food and beverage containers
- Plastic bottles with neck narrower than body, such as soda bottles, milk, water, detergent and shampoo bottles (without the bottle caps or lids please)
- Glass food and beverage containers
- Milk and juice cartons and drink boxes

Participants are asked to keep recycling free of contamination by putting only acceptable items into recycling containers. When food scraps or liquids get into the batch, they can cause a whole truckload of recyclables to be wasted.

The facility includes 400 parking spaces with brightly-colored covered bus shelters and benches for customers to comfortably wait for one of three 595 Express bus routes that serve the stop.
