WESTON'S EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

TAKE A GLIMPSE OF WESTON AT WORK DURING HURRICANE IRMA

While many Weston residents braced for Hurricane Irma at home, the City of Weston's emergency management team was fully activated at the City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC). The team continuously monitored the storm and operated a call center around the clock from Friday, September 8th through Monday, September 11th to ensure the safety of Weston residents. City facilities reopened on Tuesday.

Weston's EOC is located on the second floor of the Administrative Services Center, located next door to City Hall. Opened in July 2015, the three-story building was built to withstand 200 MPH winds and has standby generators to ensure for the continuity of municipal operations through an emergency activation.

In addition to the EOC, the Administrative Services Center houses Permitting Services (commonly referred to as the Building Department), Zoning Code Services, Code Enforcement, Fire Marshal/Fire Code Services, Technology Services and Records Storage. During the activation for Hurricane Irma, the City also had a representative assigned to Broward County's EOC and maintained contact with Broward County's Emergency Managers to coordinate response efforts as needed.

PEDESTRIAN AND CYCLIST SAFETY AFTER THE STORM

There aren't many places more conducive to exercising than Weston. The City has an extensive network of sidewalks and over 51 miles of marked bike lanes. While bicycling and walking are great fun and great for you, as with any sport or mode of transportation, precautions must be taken to prevent serious and even life-threatening injuries.

Cyclists must obey all applicable traffic control devices such as traffic signals, signs and markings. Know and use proper hand signals when turning and be especially cautious when passing through intersections. The Broward Sheriff's Office will enforce traffic laws for cyclists in the same manner that they do for motorized vehicles.

After a storm such as Hurricane Irma impacts our area, significant debris in roadways and sidewalks increase the likelihood of accidents. If you do venture out, please look out for the following:

- Inoperable traffic signals.
- Downed trees/branches and street signs that may block bike lanes or sidewalks and force you into traffic.
- Lighting may be out in some areas. It is recommended to stay off roads at dark until conditions return to normal when storm debris has been cleared and lighting has been restored.

BROWARD COUNTY HOME DAMAGE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

Broward County's Home Damage Assessment is a helpful tool used by the County to identify areas impacted with heavy damage before assessment teams are able to canvass the County. The Home Damage Assessment Program asks residents to report damage to their home, as soon as it is safe to go outside.



BEFORE THE STORM

Print the <u>sample photos</u> and place with your important papers in a waterproof container. This will help you classify any damage to your own property after the storm.

LESSONS LEARNED IN HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

Following Hurricane Irma, we all have a reminder of what needs to be done to prepare our homes and family for a hurricane.

Power Outages

Even though many utility lines are buried underground throughout Weston, electricity can still be impacted during any storm. If you have a generator, be sure to have it ready to go (tested and fueled up) before a watch is issued and have the additional fuel supply. Don't forget to stock up on fresh batteries for flashlights.

Food Safety

It is important to have enough non-perishable foods for your family. It is also a good idea to freeze water bags to help



keep fresh food items chilled following an extended power outage. Quart bags filled with water and frozen flat easily line coolers in the event of a power outage. After the storm, discard questionable items that may have spoiled due to lack of refrigeration. It only takes four hours of lost power for food to spoil. When in doubt, throw it out.

Pool Preparations

Prepare your pool by lowering the water level (no more than 2 feet) and adding extra chlorine to prevent contamination. Do not drain the pool or put pool furniture in the pool. Be sure to turn off the power to the pool pump and remove the pump and store indoors, if possible.

MAKE YOUR DONATIONS COUNT ross the country people are doing what they can to help their neighbors is

Across the country people are doing what they can to help their neighbors in need. If you're thinking about donating money to a charity to assist victims of Hurricane Harvey or Irma, here are some tips to ensure your donation counts:

- Donate to charities you know and trust and that have a proven track record.
- Avoid charities that seem to have sprung up overnight in connection with current events. Some are scams. Charities formed quickly – even if they are meant well – may not have the infrastructure to be effective.
- Research the charity with the Better Business Bureau's (BBB) Wise Giving Alliance, Charity Navigator, Charity Watch, or GuideStar. These organizations provide lists of charities they have screened that are raising funds for specific causes.
- Don't assume that charity messages posted on social media are legitimate. Research the organization yourself. Search the organization name and words like "scam."
- Designate the disaster. Charities may give the option to designate your giving to a specific relief effort, this will ensure your funds are going to help hurricane victims, rather than the organizations general fund.
- Give directly rather than through a paid fundraiser. Professional fundraisers get a percentage of your donation, sometimes 50 percent or more.
- When texting to donate, confirm the number with the source before you donate.
 The charge will show up on your mobile phone bill, but donations are not immediate.
- Check out the <u>Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) volunteer and donation page</u>. It outlines the best ways you can help people and communities who are impacted by a disaster.



THE EQUIFAX DATA BREACH TIPS TO AVOID IDENTITY THEFT

Following the recent Equifax data breach, it is recommended to take steps to prevent identity theft. Some ways to do that are to place a credit freeze on each of the three major credit bureaus – Equifax, Transunion and Experian; another is to place fraud alerts on your credit which requires that an agency verify your identity prior to extending new credit to you.

Fraud Alert

Fraud alerts are free and are active for 90 days. You can renew it, but you will have to remember to do so or else it will expire automatically. Victims of identity theft are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which lasts seven years.

Credit Freeze

With a credit freeze no one, not even you, can access your credit report to open new accounts. You will get a PIN number to use each time you want to unfreeze and freeze your account to apply for new credit. For non-ID theft victims, the cost for a freeze is approximately \$10 per credit bureau each time you take action on your account.
