Weston's fire trucks and EMS (Emergency Medical Service) vehicles have a new look. The City recently purchased four new fire engines, five new EMS trucks and one new tower ladder. Since the

City owns the vehicles the distinctive designs on each truck were designed by the City as well. Weston's decision to purchase the vehicles rather than have the Sheriff provide them within the contract resulted in a cost savings

Weston Fire Rescue offers many services beyond emergency medical and fire protection and prevention services. Education being considered paramount to the well-being of the community, Broward County Fire Rescue personnel participated



in Falcon Cove Middle School's "Flight of the Falcons Day" on November 14, 2008, to educate students about the equipment firefighters utilize while on the tour of duty, safety and prevention tactics.

As the bell rang to switch class periods, students from each grade rushed out to the school's track and field to engage in fun activities such as potato sack races, basketball games and soccer shoot-out matches – but the real attraction was the fire rescue engine, ambulance and

firefighters. Students had the opportunity to speak to the firefighters, tour the fire engine to learn about the equipment, and even try on DUI (Driving Under the Influence) Goggles that simulate the feeling of intoxication. As students wore the goggles and tried to walk in a straight line, they quickly learned how difficult it is to function on such a simple task, such as walking, while under the influence.


### Open to the Public for Enjoyment

n the crisp fall evening of October 30th, the City Commission energized the Florida Author's Fountain, the centerpiece of Library Park, as the symbolic grand opening of Weston's newest and probably the last major park to be constructed in the city. Open to the public, the event included music, light refreshments and Art on a Limb, which featured hundreds of Library Park bookmarks adorned with an original drawing by a Weston student, all hanging from the trees to be selected by guests as a one-of-a-kind keepsake.

Library Park is a stunning, tranquil retreat for residents, students, and library patrons alike. The park includes three gazebos of varying sizes which will be used for shaded relaxation along with social events, book fairs, study groups and children's Storytime readings. The centerpiece, the Florida Author's Fountain, is so named for the informational plaques on Florida Authors that ring the walls surrounding the cascading waters. Another highlight and educational feature is the Weston History Walk which tells of our city's rich archeological past. Follow the bronze plaques imbedded in the sidewalk for a strolling education on Weston, then spread out a blanket or sit upon one of the many park benches throughout this lushly landscape escape.

## Connecting Students to Nature

A Partnership Made Not in Heaven, But in the Garden

For over a year now, Weston's 10 public schools have been the benefactors of a great partnership, forged through an initiative by long-time Weston proponent, environmentalist and all-round great individual, Mr.. Roy Rogers. Asked what the Environmental – Educational Partnership means to him, Roy said he feels that it celebrates connectivity with the community and symbolizes a handshake between the city and schools.

Roy Rogers has spent a life-time on a personal quest to connect students to nature. This partnership does just that, by adding to the student's school curriculum, and to their lives, a journey that never has to end – one of an education and appreciation of nature. The partnership is a simple one, involving Roy, the City of Weston and the School Board of Broward County. The School Board approved the construction of butterfly gardens on the property of each school in Weston, along with the erection of a sign. At each school

Roy provides the plant materials, planting design, knowledge, enthusiasm, and love of the environment, inspiring students of all ages. *Priceless*.

# Weston University Program Class of 2009

The City's Weston University Program, initiated in 2002, has graduated six classes and in October welcomed the Class of 2009. An objective achieved this year, the program includes students from three high schools: Cypress Bay, Sagemont and now Western, due to the boundaring of Weston students attending Western High. The program has seen its share of interest around the county and around the State, now being highlighted in the Florida League of Cities Citizen Academy Guide.

In October, November and December classes, the students learned about state and local government while visiting city hall and speaking with City Manager John Flint and Mayor Eric Hersh. They spent an afternoon at the Weston Public Safety Building viewing and discussing law enforcement operations. Students participated in Crime Scene Investigation techniques including lifting fingerprints and fluids of a wrecked vehicle, after learning of the many requirements such chain of evidence and documentation. Students also tried to "walk the line" while wearing DUI goggles which simulate the effects of having had several drinks, proving that while you may THINK your reflexes and responses aren't impaired – they are.

In December, Community Services hosted the group where students teamed up to design their "dream park". After each group presented their park, designs were critiqued on issues such as layout, access, parking, maintenance, security and cost – all factors other than the "fun" factor which goes into building a municipal park. Students also went into the field with the "unseen heroes" of municipal government – our public works professionals who maintain the water and sewer lines, waterways, landscaping, and wetland mitigation areas within the City.

### Re-Elected Without Opposition

Each were un-opposed and automatically re-elected to serve another four years in office. At the November 17, 2008 City Commission meeting the Mayor and Commissioners each recited their Oaths of Office.

Stephanie Gomez, also a teacher within the city, proudly swore in her husband, Commissioner Angel Gomez as their children, Samantha, Andrew and Jacob stood by dad's side.

Commissioner Mercedes Henriksson was sworn in by her close friends Renee Smoley and Roy Rogers. Renee many years ago was given the term of endearment as the Mother of Weston and Roy, the Father of Weston; Commissioner Henriksson's proud husband Otto watched from the audience as Weston's "parents" swore in his wife for a second term in office.

Lastly, Mayor Eric Hersh was provided with what he called the great honor of being able to be sworn in by his two children, Stephanie and Mathew, who were just elementary school age when the Mayor took office on Weston's very first Commission back in 1996. His proud wife Laurie stood at his side. The term limits that Mayor Hersh brought forward and helped to adopt, preclude him from being able to run for re-election at the completion of his next four years.

### Owls Relocated from Center Field

City Provides Condo Assistance for Burrowing Owls

Throughout the summer, two adult Florida Burrowing Owls had made themselves at home in the center of soccer field #3 at Weston's Vista Park.

Burrowing Owls do just as the name implies – they burrow or dig into the ground making a tunnel-like home.

These 9-inch underground dwellers particularly like golf courses and ball fields due to their soft, sandy soil and night-time lighting which attracts insects, their main food supply.

Relocating the cute creatures is more involved than filling in their burrow. The owls are considered a species of special concern within the State of Florida, as they have lost their habitat to development throughout the area. In the case of the Vista Park pair, the City's Parks and Recreation Department operated under the direction of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Division of Habitat and Species Conservation, Species Conservation Planning Section.

The nest was undisturbed through the

mating season and then guidelines were followed in the construction of a new burrow, which was placed on the "other side of the fence" along the fenced off embankment, to ensure the burrow is not disturbed. A new condo built for two!



# Infrared Aerial Photos of all Properties in Broward

Helpful in Identifying Rooftop Moisture

The Broward County Property Appraiser's web site has a new feature that can assist owners of any home, business or structure. You can view infrared aerial photos, to assist you in identifying rooftop areas where moisture may be accumulating. Anyone with a leaking roof will find this particularly helpful, and it can be used as a preventative resource.

Condominium residents and HOA Boards may want to share this information with their maintenance workers/company.

One caution: ignore areas with tree

overhang as that will show high moisture contact.

Steps for viewing infrared aerials:

- Click "Property Search" and follow steps to pull up property record
- When at the property record, click "View Map" to view the aerial
- On the left side, click on the drop down "Aerials" to select the <u>Infrared</u> 2008 photos

### How's Weston Doing?

### Eric M. Hersh, Mayor

The most frequent question asked of me, almost daily, is "How is Weston doing in these difficult financial times?"

In short, the answer is very well. Sure, we are experiencing a downturn like everyone else, including a marked increase in housing foreclosures, and business downturns. However, our conservative forecasting and business models, and our contract form of government have allowed us to maintain a strong balance sheet during these challenging times.

Although we went through our budget process last September, we are still comfortable with our forecasts through the end of this Fiscal Year. We have maintained all our service levels, and expect to continue to be able to maintain the high standards we set.

### Some interesting statistics comparing Fiscal Year 2008 vs Fiscal Year 2009:

- Taxable Value of property in Weston is expected to decline 5.3% to \$7.97 billion
- Total City Revenue is expected to decline 2.5% to \$99 million
- State Revenue sharing which comes back to the city is expected to decline 17.5%
- Expenditures for the City are expected to decline by 9.6% from last year
- Our general fund reserves are currently 1.3 times our annual general fund budget, well above the targets we set years ago

So sure, the tasks are challenging, but we are constantly looking to improve our model, and adjust where ever we can to cut expenses, while at the same time, now is NOT the time to cut back on those expenses which make Weston a special place to live and work. Times will improve, as the economy always goes through cycles, and during difficult cycles we must invest and improve, so that when the cycle turns, we lead the way out.

Our housing market is suffering as it is throughout the country, especially in Florida. However, we are benefiting by the tax portability more than most cities in Broward. People want to live in Weston, so as prices have declined, people are looking at opportunities in our community. If we were to cut our ascetics, and cut our services, we would be less desirable, and fall to be like every other city. That is not a wise course; so instead, we continue to

provide the standard of services you have come to expect in Weston. Be positive, be enthusiastic about where we live, and enjoy life in Weston! This nation has faced adversity before and has come through with flying colors. I have no doubt that we will do so again.

Allow me to comment on Davie Commons, a massive 2.1 million square foot retail/office/hotel project proposed to be developed on the east side of I-75 at Royal Palm Boulevard. This project would create over 32,000 trips per day on I-75 and Weston's roads, and although the project is completely in the Town of Davie, ALL the impact of traffic is in Weston. Some of you have been asked in surveys by the developer if you would like a high end shopping mall near Weston. The problem



is the developer doesn't explain that the impact to our quality of life would be dramatic, and very negative, in terms of traffic, crime, and the need to widen and expand our roadway system.

In November, the Broward County Commission heard this issue, and passed it up to the next level on a 5-3 vote (5 votes are required for approval). We MUST have this project defeated - it is the one issue that could derail much of what we have accomplished as to quality of life in Weston.

Broward County Commissioner Lois
Wexler is one of two members of the
County Commission representing a portion
of Weston, as well as representing the area
where the project is located. Commissioner
Wexler fought hard on our behalf, voting
AGAINST the project. I know she will do
so again when this comes back to the



County Commission for a final vote. **Broward County Commissioner Diana** Wasserman-Rubin represents the greater portion of Weston. Commissioner Wasserman-Rubin voted IN FAVOR of the project, despite the fact that the project is outside of her district. It was Commissioner Wasserman-Rubin's vote that could have stopped this project, and therefore, by her vote, she has forced us to continue to spend thousands of dollars to continue to fight this project. The project comes back to the County Commission for a final vote in a few months, and we need your help in telling Commissioner Wasserman-Rubin that we want to maintain our lifestyle in Weston, and that approving a project that puts the entire traffic burden in Weston is unacceptable! Many of you have already helped out by contacting her, but I would encourage you to do so again. This is a fight we can't afford to lose!

As we begin 2009, we are hopeful that it is the beginning of better economic times for all. On behalf of Commissioner Stermer, Commissioner Chermak, Commissioner Henriksson and Commissioner Gomez, we wish you much health, happiness, and prosperity throughout this New Year.

# Whitefly Destroy How to

Ficus trees and hedges throughout South Florida have been hard hit by the Ficus Whitefly, which causes the leaves to turn yellow and drop from the plant. The pest is new to the continental US and has been found mainly infesting ficus, weeping fig, banyan trees, strangler fig, fiddle-leaf fig and banana-leaf fig; all species of ficus.

The underside of infested leaves look as though they are dotted with small, silver or white spots. The insects feed on the underside of the leaves with their "needle-like" mouthparts, and can seriously injure the host plants causing wilting, yellowing, stunting growth, leaf drop and even death.

### Controlling Infestation:

Efforts to understand and control this pest are still on-going but there are several options currently available.

- Monitor ficus plants for early signs of infestation which will be easier to manage (prior to defoliation); look for the specks on the underside of leaves.
- Insecticidal soap or oil sprays are effective for small trees or shrubs

   coverage of the undersides of leaves is especially important. It is necessary to repeat applications every 7-10 days. If hedges are

trimmed, bag clippings to reduce spreading insects.

 Once infestation has been removed, feed with fertilizer to assist foliage in recovery.

### Preserving Landscape Not Infected -


The current recommendation is to:

- Drench the soil around the base of the tree or hedge with a product that contains a neonicotinoid compound (you can ask at your garden supply). These products can provide sufficient control for 4-8 months depending on the size of the tree or shrub.
- Monitor plants 3 months after application for the presence of nymphs.
   This can also be applied to treat "hot spots" or get quick knockdown, in addition to the soil applications, but should not be applied to all of the foliage. The soil application will provide the longest control.

\*\* These applications are recommended to be done by a professional pest control service. All but one brand of the chemicals require a license to purchase. An experienced, licensed landscape contractor could also make the application.

### City maintained landscaping has also been affected –

Some trees and hedges in the city rightsof-way have been damaged by this pest. Crews have and continue to apply sprays to control the whitefly and minimize further injury. There are cases where nymphs were already active on the ficus before it completely absorbed the pesticides. The damaged hedges have been treated with fertilizer and plant stimulants to help the ficus recover and regenerate as quickly as possible. As we are in the semi-dormant time of year, they will take a bit longer to heal. The liquid applications will be repeated as necessary until the plant has fully recovered and once again provides the same buffer for residents as before. This process is faster and more economical than installing new material and waiting for it to mature and provide a similar buffer size.

# A Note from the City Manager John R. Flint

The current downturn in the global economy gives good cause for concern as to where we as a city are going in the future. To best look forward it helps to understand where we've been and where we are today.

Prior to the city's incorporation in 1996, we prepared a five-year business plan that forecasted our infrastructure and services needs and the associated revenues and expenses needed to support those needs. In doing so we set the foundation to operate the city in a business-like manner and used the business plan as a tool by

which to identify our goals and methodically achieve them.

As the city's first five years drew to a close we prepared the 2010 Strategic Value and Business Plan. This new plan utilized a ten year horizon and embraced the concept that value be added to each and every-thing that we do. Utilizing a ten year horizon enabled us to take a more comprehensive and long-term approach to providing, maintaining and enhancing the City's infrastructure and services. Embracing the value added concept assured that we remain mindful of our obligation to add value to the City, through increased property values and enhancing the quality of life that has brought us all to Weston. The plan was specifically designed to be reviewed periodically with the flexibility to be able to adapt to or counter conditions beyond our control.

The 2010 Plan worked as designed and successfully provided the basis for the ensuing city budgets.


In 2004, the 2010 Plan was updated to the 2015 Plan. The ability to review and amend the plan proved both useful and necessary when in 2006 and 2007 the Florida Legislature and Governor implemented tax reform measures that impacted the City's ability to generate

certain revenues, thereby causing us to take a comprehensive look at the 2015 Plan.

Today we are finalizing the 2018 Plan which not only takes into account the recent tax reform measures, but also accounts for the impacts of the current economic environment. This iteration of the plan will guide us through these uncertain times by identifying the resources necessary to assure that we are able to maintain and enhance our infrastructure and services, not diminish our quality of life, and be well prepared for the return of a healthy economy.

The 2018 Strategic Value and Business Plan is built on the foundation of our original business plan and its successors, all of which have enabled us to make sound decisions in a business-like manner, and this newest plan will enable us to continue to do the same into the future.

Evidence of the success of these plans is our ability to continue to maintain, enhance and add to our infrastructure, and thereby continue to add value to the City, despite the current economic climate. Some of the projects currently in progress are the rebuilding of the storm water management system serving the Bonaventure community that replaces 40 year old pumps with a state-of-the-art system in storm hardened structures; Manatee Isles Drive will be upgraded with the addition of curbing, bicycle lanes, drainage and landscaping; and the City's traffic and



street signage will be replaced with a newly designed system that will withstand 100 mph winds.

In the event the new President and the Congress enact an economic stimulus package that includes funding for local government infrastructure, the 2018 Plan already identifies our infrastructure needs and will enable us to respond quickly to move these projects forward.

Weston's future remains bright, in part

due to its past. Our Strategic Value and Business Plans are one of the cornerstones of our municipal corporation that has, along with our proven contract style of managing our government, positioned us to be prepared to successfully meet the challenges that lie ahead.

From all of us who have the privilege to serve you, our best wishes for a healthy and prosperous new year, and remember, we're only a phone call or email away.

# Saving Money and Energy

CITY INITIATES ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAM IN CITY BUILDINGS AND STREET LIGHTS



### CITY OWNED BUILDINGS

The City has embarked on an energy and money saving retrofit of older technology fluorescent lighting fixtures in all city-owned buildings. The current fixtures are being replaced with new, energy efficient fixtures which provide for a 25% reduction in energy consumption, resulting in a 25% savings on electricity costs, while also reducing greenhouse gases.

The replacement of fixtures has already been completed in the Police and Public Works facilities. The Weston Community Center, three fire stations and all city maintenance buildings and outdoor restroom buildings within city parks will be completed by the end of the year. Weston City Hall was constructed with energy efficient fixtures so it is not included in the project. The payback or return on investment for the cost of the new fixtures is approximately 2 1/2 years.

#### CITY OWNED STREET LIGHTS

A second energy conservation program will commence this Spring, which will provide for energy cost savings of over \$60,000 annually. A comprehensive study of the city owned street lighting system was conducted which includes 1,300 street lights in the Indian Trace Development District along city roadways. The project will provide for the installation of voltage regulators at each of the 38 electricity service points which provide energy to the street lights. The regulators reduce the voltage which is drawn, with no perceptible reduction in the light emitted.

There are a number of additional benefits to the project which include an immediate and lasting cost savings of 25-30% on electric costs (over \$60,000 per year), an extended life of the current fixtures and lamps of up to 300%, and a carbon footprint reduction of 369 metric tons of CO2 emission per year.

The payback is 2 to 3 years, and the life expectancy of the regulator system is estimated at over 25 years. City leaders are looking forward to the completion of this energy efficiency program by the end of 2009.

# Community Parks Update

lifestyle. The Community Services
Department is constantly assessing the
equipment and fields at every facility. By
providing, protecting, and maintaining
our parks, Weston is sustaining the
natural environment that in turn sustains
us as individuals and as a community.

### *Improvements Include:*

Library Park – Is now open to the public! Located on 5-acres adjacent to the Weston Branch Library (at 4255 Bonaventure Boulevard) the park features three gazebos, perfect for story-time, school class visits, and outdoor library classrooms while the Weston History Walk, conducive for a pleasant stroll through the park, tells of our City's rich archeological history. The open lawn provides a place to spread a blanket and read in the sun and the benches surrounding the Florida Author's Fountain, which showcases those Floridians who have contributed to our literary culture, invite relaxation while enjoying the sight and sound of rushing waters. To make the park even more attractive, Wi-Fi will be available in the Spring of 2009.

Vista Park – Resurfacing of the playground is complete. The new, poured-in-place rubberized surfacing provides for a safe, consistent surface that minimizes injuries due to falls while providing for greater ease of accessibility.

Gator Run Park – The new playground surfacing will be completed as of February 1st.

Eagle Point Park – Resurfacing on the playground will be complete in March. The open playfield has been redesigned with more drainage to allow for safer playing conditions.

Tequesta Trace Park – Major renovation of the stadium field (used for football and lacrosse) is complete. New drainage under the surface has been designed to rapidly remove rain water from the field, allowing for safer playing conditions while preserving the grass. Construction of a new storage facility is nearing



The City of Weston budget reflects an Ad Valorem millage rate of 1.5235 mills, an increase from the previous year's rate of 1.3215 mills. The 1.5235 millage rate is the same rate adopted for the City's first fiscal year in 1997-98 and each year thereafter through 2006-07. The City's Gross Taxable Value decreased by 5.35% over the prior year's Gross Taxable Value, to \$7,971,771,379. The impact of this decrease in Gross Taxable Value at the Fiscal Year 2008 millage rate of 1.3215 would have resulted in a loss of \$545,000 in Ad Valorem proceeds. The adoption of the millage rate of 1.5235 will result in an increase of Ad Valorem revenues of \$984,800 when compared to Fiscal Year 2008, and thereby will not require the use of reserves to balance this budget.


City-wide expenditures are reduced from the Fiscal Year 2008 total of \$109,294,424 to \$99,141,200 to compensate for the decrease in the City's revenues. Expenditures within the City's General Fund are also reduced from \$37,118,700 to \$34,204,900. No cost reductions were made to the areas of public safety and maintenance of infrastructure as the City looks to maintain its core service levels. In conjunction with maintaining these core service levels the City has recently completed or started the following projects.

- Tequesta Trace Park Weston Area Little League storage building
- Bonaventure Blvd. at Saddle Club Rd. traffic roundabout
- Bonaventure Blvd. at Blatt Blvd. traffic roundabout
- Bonaventure Blvd. left-turn lanes at Royal Poinciana Dr., Birchwood Way and Lakeview Dr.
- Manatee Isles Dr. Improvement Project
- South Post Rd. at North Ridge Dr. traffic signal
- Indian Trace at Saddle Club Rd. traffic signal
- Library Park
- Bonaventure pump stations
- Traffic sign replacement
- New City-owned EMS and Fire Rescue vehicles
- Tequesta Trace Park athletic field improvements
- Wi-Fi network at Regional Park and Library Park
- Traffic signal video detection system along Weston Rd. and the eastern portion of Royal Palm Blvd.
- Fire Station 67 emergency traffic signal
- Expanded facilities at Fire Station 81
- Final phase of the 2006 Master Re-landscaping Plan
- Street light energy conservation program
- Energy efficient lighting retrofit in City owned buildings
- Begin annual lift station and sewer line repair program

It is essential that through this economic downturn we maintain our commitment to public safety, we maintain our infrastructure, and we maintain our reserves; collectively they enable us to sustain the quality of life and the value of our City that brought residents and businesses to Weston, and that we all have come to expect. The consequences of allowing our public safety, infrastructure, and reserves to deteriorate would have a long-term effect on our quality of life and the value of our City that would take years and even greater resources to recover from. While this may require increases in the Ad Valorem tax rate and fees for services from time to time, doing so will enable us to be better prepared for the improved economic times that will eventually come.
