

First, allow me the privilege of welcoming our newest City Commissioner, Murray Chermak. Commissioner Chermak has long been involved in our city, beginning with the incorporation of Weston, and the annexation of Bonaventure. I am certain that he will be a valuable addition to the City Commission.

I would also like to thank former Commissioner Edwin Jacobson for his years of service to our community. Commissioner Jacobson served our city with distinction for more than 6 years, and contributed greatly to where we are today.

On behalf of Commissioner Robin Bartleman, Commissioner Barbara Herrera-Hill, Commissioner Stermer and our entire community, I offer congratulations and our welcome to Commissioner Chermak, and our thanks to Commissioner Jacobson for his many years of service to Weston.

The last few months have been very busy for the City Commission, and we have made some very significant advances for Weston. One of the most important events has been the assignment of all of the developer's rights under the Town Foundation to the City of Weston. What that means for you is that for those residing in the Arvida built sections of our city, the underlying association, called the Town Foundation, is now under the complete control of the City Commission. Over the past couple of years, we have been determined to consolidate all entities with the ability to assess or tax your property under the City Commission's control. This way, your elected officials will be those responsible for the costs and actions of these

entities. The City Commission now fully controls the Indian Trace Development District, the West Lauderdale Water Control District, Keep Bonaventure Beautiful (KBB), The Bonaventure Development District and the Town Foundation. This means that besides the City, the only other entity that you must deal with is your neighborhood homeowner's association.

With this change in the Town Foundation, your quarterly payments to the Town Foundation will shortly be discontinued, and we will add the assessment, which is solely for the bulk cable contract, to your water bill. Of course, we are still obligated to the contract that Arvida signed for cable TV service, however, when this contract is up, in approximately five years, your elected City Commission will be responsible for considering extending, re-negotiating, or terminating this contract. When we get closer to this event, we will seek your input through public meetings and hearings on this controversial topic. In the meantime, look for upcoming information about this billing change.

On other news, I'm sure you have noticed all the road improvements, new traffic signals, and park improvements

over the past few months. Although we have made tremendous strides, we still have a lot planned. Vista Park, a 30+ acre park behind Cypress Bay High School will be under construction soon. Besides additional soccer and baseball fields, we are working on a joint venture with

to build an ice arena, similar to Incredible Ice in Coral Springs. This would provide an additional avenue for our youth to spend their time constructively in hockey programs, figure skating, youth camps, and open skating sessions and more.

Additionally, the YMCA is in their final stages of planning for a fantastic facility at the Regional Park, which would include an Olympic-size swimming pool, gymnasium, teen center, meeting rooms and fitness center. We are also in the design stages of improving Eagle Point Park, and have completed Gator Run Park. Improvements in traffic control are in the design stages at the Regional Park, along with a round-about at the entrance of the park.

For more information on these and other projects, please check our web site periodically. Found at www.westonfl.org, our web site has a wealth of information about your city, including upcoming events and current projects. I hope you are also listening to our new radio station, 1680 AM for up-to-the-minute information. The web site and radio station, along with the cable TV, can also be used for emergency notifications, therefore providing us with effective communications tools to reach you when the need arises.

We have finally reached the long awaited, long talked about stage of the major developer leaving Weston. We have planned this event for some time now, and have negotiated several agreements to help facilitate the final transfers of responsibility to the City. I feel very good about where we stand, and I am very comfortable that the departure of Arvida will have no negative impact on our community, but in fact, allows us to make some improvements we have long been awaiting.

I am more excited than ever about our City. We have accomplished a tremendous amount over the past couple of years, and although our work to improve our community and way of life will never end, our vision of post developer Weston has become a reality, and we have nothing but enthusiasm about the future.

The Persona Behind "The Voice"


The Voice of Weston Community Radio

CHANGES IN CABLE BILLING FOR SOME

ADVANCED CABLE CUSTOMERS IN ARVIDA DEVELOPED PROPERTIES TO SEE A CHANGE

Customers of Advanced Cable Communications that reside in Arvida developed properties, those under the Town Foundation, Inc., will soon be billed for cable with your utility bill.

In February, the City Commission approved the assignment of the Developer Rights of the Town Foundation, Inc., from Arvida/JMB Partners to the City of Weston, effective April 30th, 2003. With this assignment, the City is now responsible for the administration of the Service Agreement between the Town Foundation and Advanced Cable Communications, Inc.

HOW THIS AFFECTS YOU AS A CABLE Customer of advanced cable:

Effective July 1, 2003 - Billing for basic cable service will be included as part of your utility bill, each month, rather than the previously used, quarterly assessment billing. Billing for premium services will continue to be sent by Advanced Cable.

The first bill will be prorated from July 1, 2003, through your meter reading date. Thereafter, it will be a flat-monthly rate for each bill and will cover the same period as the meter reading date.

A Note from the City Manager

Just how good is good? The Florida Department of Law Enforcement has just issued the 2002 Florida Uniform Crime Report which captures the Total Index Crime for the year ending December 31, 2002. For the second year in a row the City of Weston has the lowest crime rate of anywhere in Broward County, and not by a little, by a lot. The average crime rate for all of Broward County is 4,379.2 crimes per 100,000 population; the crime rate for the City of Weston is 976.6. And it gets even better; the percent of crimes cleared in all of Broward County averages 26.1% while the percent of crimes cleared in the City of Weston is the highest in all of Broward County at 61.6%.

Having the lowest crime rate takes great leadership and outstanding police work in the field. Congratulations to the Broward Sheriff's Office Deputies, Community Service Aide's and support staff of Weston's District VIII, who have worked so hard for these results. Congratulations to Chief Greg Page and Sheriff Ken Jenne for their leadership and never-ending support of their subordinates and of the Weston lifestyle.

So what does this mean to our residents and businesses? It means that we have one of the safest places in which to invest in a home, invest in a business, and raise a family in the region. It means that our property values will continue to grow as

City "Steps Up to the Plate" and Then Some Providing Technical Assistance and Personnel for March Election

The Office of the Supervisor of Elections had for months been warning cities that they would need to "step up to the plate" by providing far more staffing and money than they had provided in the past, to ensure that the March 2003 municipal elections would go smoothly. Weston did just that, and more.

Only recently sworn in as City Clerk in October of 2002, Weston City Clerk Patty Bates and her staff were presented with significant challenges and additional responsibilities not usually assigned to the cities. In the past, Weston, with 19 precincts had to pay 131 poll workers, which included clerks, assistant clerks, inspectors and poll deputies.

This election, Weston was faced with also having to provide:

- 23 Voting System Technicians (VSTs) for a 15-hour election day, and an additional 8-hours mandatory training/certification;
- provide a clerk at the Weston Call Center for 5 hours;
- provide four persons at the Regional Center on two days for 4 hours each; and
- arrange for the pickup and delivery of the voting machines from each of our city's precincts to the Regional Center, requiring the rental of five delivery trucks and 11 personnel.

To assist in this effort, Weston called upon two of our contract providers: Severn Trent Environmental Services, Inc., providing finance, administration and public works services, and Calvin, Giordano & Associates, Inc., our planning and engineering firm. The two firms provided 19 highly-skilled individuals to serve as VSTs, helping to ensure that Weston was fully staffed and ready to go at 7AM election morning.

Going a step beyond what was called for, Weston set up its ow Election Call Center. Three of Severn Trent's top Information Technology personnel designed and set up a Call Center at City Har Their system integrated the city map, broken out by precinct, with web interface and database system. Clicking on any precinct, the system contained the address, local-access contact, precinct clerk and VS information, and graphically reflected the precincts current status Beginning at 5AM, the staff staffed phones and entered information into the system at each interval of the opening process, throughout the day and right through until every polling location was closed and the machines were transferred to the Regional Center. Due to the availability of instantaneous information, the staff was able to effective address and mitigate issues as they arose, providing for an incident-freelection process in Weston.



- Determine escape routes from your home and places to meet and also an out of area person to call, so all family members have a point of contact.
- Make a plan for what to do with your pets (they cannot be taken to shelters)
- Post emergency telephone numbers by phones/Do children know when & how to call 911?
- Check insurance policy now for hurricane and flood damage coverage. Once a Hurricane Watch is issued, insurance companies will not write any new policies or make adjustments to current policies.
- Document your valuables by photographing/videotaping them. Keep records secure in a safety deposit box or waterproof unit.

WHEN A STORM IS APPROACHING

- Secure all outside objects. Bring loose objects such as patio furniture, garden tools and planters, inside.
- Fill vehicle fuel tanks and generators
- Turn refrigerator & freezer to the coldest setting.
- Fill bathtubs and any large containers with water for washing, cleaning and flushing toilets, since electric power may go out of service.
- If your cable is working, tune to channel 25 (Advanced Cable) or channel 18 (Comcast), for up-to-date City information on boil water orders and other related information.
- TUNE YOUR CAR RADIO TO 1680AM for City emergency information, boil water orders and other important notifications. The 1680 Emergency notification system will be operational even with a power outage for approximately four (4) days.

DISASTER SURVIVAL KIT

Emergency supplies should be adequate to last at least 3 days. A 10-day supply of water, food and medicine is recommended.



When in doubt - please call

Residents, businesses and realtors are urged to take note of the City's regulations regarding real estate signs:

- NO sign may be placed in a public or private right-of-way.
- Signs on residential lots cannot exceed 2-square feet in area;
- Signs must be removed within 3 days of closing or signing of a lease agreement;
- Leasing signs may not exceed 2-square feet in area, shall identify the name and phone number of the property manager and may only be placed in the window of the premises offered for lease.

The City has the authority to remove signs not in compliance, so please contact our Planning & Zoning department at 954-921-7781 if you have any questions as to the placement of real estate signage.



I-75 Southbound Off-Ramp Modifications - In the Works

The City of Weston, in a joint project with the Florida Department Transportation and Broward County, is proceeding with the design, pemitting and construction of modifications to the I-75 southbound or ramp with westbound Arvida Parkway.

DESIGN OF THE IMPROVEMENT IS CURRENTLY UNDER WAY, WITH CONSTRUCTION ANTICIPATED TO BEGIN EARLY 2004

The proposed improvements include removing the merge section of the southbound off-ramp and realigning the ramp at almost 90-degrees with westbound Arvida Parkway. The single-lane off-ramp will be converted a long set of dual right-turn lanes which will prevent back-ups on mainline I-75. The re-aligned T-intersection will be signalized and interconnected to the Arvida Parkway/Weston Road signal, for coordinate signal operations. The traffic signal will then "meter" the traffic flows between the off-ramp and westbound Arvida Parkway based on deman

The primary benefit is that southbound off-ramp traffic will be able maneuver to the left-turn lanes at Weston Road without having to wea with conflicting traffic. Similarly, westbound traffic on Arvida Parkw will not have to worry about potential merging conflicts from off-ran traffic.

With twelve municipal parks, the Community Services Department is constantly assessing the equipment and fields at every facility. Maintenance, improvements and upgrades are provided to preserve and enhance the superb quality of our Weston parks system. Recent or upcoming improvements include:

- Tequesta Trace Park: New Hockey Rink ("B") at Tequesta Trace Park has been completed; New shade covers have been installed on the soccer fields and adjacent to the playground.
- Windmill Ranch Park: New playground equipment and shade cover is being installed.
- Gator Run and the Regional Park New restrooms to be constructed beginning this summer, with a projected completion by November.
- Eagle Point Park design plans are being finalized with construction to begin by late fall.
- Vista Park This new 30-acre facility will see construction begin in late summer or early fall.


Hot Jazz in the Cool of the Night
