the end, the improvements will move traffic quicker and safer, and will have been worth the short term delays. Arvida Parkway entrances to I-75 are being improved both getting on and off of southbound I-75. Both improvements are badly needed and have been long awaited as permits with the Department of Transportation took some time. We have all the permits now and when the work is complete, the improvements will really help. We also hope you like the improvements along Weston Road - I've heard many positive comments, and I think it's turning out great.

The City is are also embarking on a signal timing project to make navigating our streets easier. Over the next few months, our traffic engineers will be mapping out a signal coordination plan which will allow signals to "talk" with each other, and move traffic along more effectively. We real-

ize that as Weston has grown, the challenge to keep cars moving along our streets has been more challenging and we are work-

ing hard to keep up.

We are also improving areas around all the schools, adding curbing that will prevent the swales from being torn up, and that will provide for streetside

parking for pick up and drop off of students. At some school areas, such as Country Isles, the work is somewhat more complicated as street improvements are also needed, but we will get to each area and make the needed improvements.

Hopefully you are all checking our website periodically as notices are posted right on the home page, of events and issues such as construction delays. Please make our website, www.westonfl.org, a part of your routine internet surfing and keep informed about your city. You can also find information about the Advanced Cable lawsuit on the website to keep you up-to-date on developments in this important case.

Important city announcements and detailed information on city events, classes, sports registrations and much more is available our radio station, 1680 AM, 24 hours a day. Tune in periodically while driving around Weston and get up to date, real time information.

Finally, please rest assured that with all the traffic issues we are dealing with, the city will continue to vigorously oppose the development of "Davie Commons," which would bring a 2 million square-foot mall across I-75, along with an enormous amount of traffic to Weston.

Award Received for Sixth Consecutive Year

Michal Szymonowicz, Severn Trent's Budget Director for Weston was in a familiar situation at the April 4th City Commission meeting: accepting the Certificate of Achievement Plaque awarded to the City by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada.

For the sixth consecutive year, the City of Weston was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its comprehensive annual financial report. This certificate is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting.

City Saves Residents Over \$2 Million by Refinancing Bonds at a Lower Rate

Weston refinanced the \$59 million that remained on an original \$65 million bond issue at a reduced interest rate, saving residents in the Indian Trace Development District (ITDD) area over \$2 million. The original bond was issued in 1997 to pay for the ITDD water management system. The savings will be passed on to the approximately 16,000 property owners in this area, decreasing their annual ITDD assessment by approximately 15% for the upcoming year.

City Commissioners took advantage of an excellent bond market, additionally securing a AAA rating for the bonds, enabling the City to significantly reduce annual debt payments. The bonds were refinanced for 4.34 percent from their original 5.14 percent.

Saving money and lowering taxes...an appealing deal all around.

Traditionally that is thought of by providing high quality law enforcement and fire rescue services by the men and women of the Broward Sheriff's Office who come to Weston to serve and protect us each and every day; for this we are all very appreciative. Yet there is another security that the City provides which is equally important, and that is our financial security.


Far and away not as exciting a topic as our Parks and Recreation or our Police and Fire activities, our annual audit is however Each year we have an independent audit performed of all of the city's finances, as provided for in the city's Charter and prescribed by Florida law. The law goes so far as to prescribe how the independent auditor is to be selected and hired so as to assure independence and fairness. The City Commission is responsible for the selection and hiring of the auditor who reports to the City Commission, thereby making the auditor independent of city staff.

It is the auditor's job to review the city's financial reporting and internal control procedures, to review the city's transactions with its contracted service providers, both public and private, and to identify any weaknesses, misstatements, and/or irregularities that may exist. The standards under which the audit is performed

This year our audit was performed by the firm of Keefe, McCullough & LLP. Certified Public Co., Accountants. located Fort Lauderdale. Their work began shortly after the close of our last fiscal year, being September 30, 2004 and was completed in January 2005. A public presentation of the audit made before the City Commission in March, 2005. In a very concise summary: Everything was in good order.

By having successfully completed this past years' independent audit, our residents and businesses can be confident that the tax dollars they entrust to the city are being accounted for properly, and that the City's finances are indeed safe and secure.

Lane Closures to Watch for Over the Summer

I-75 Southbound Off-Ramp at Arvida Parkway

A project is underway to remove the merge section of the southbound off-ramp and realign the ramp at almost 90 degrees with westbound Arvida Parkway. A traffic signal will be installed at the new T-shaped intersection and interconnected to the Arvida Parkway signal. Southbound off-ramp traffic will be able to maneuver to the left-turn lanes at Weston Road.

Traffic Signal Mast Arm Cleaning & Painting Program

Watch for temporary lane closures beginning along Arvida Parkway at traffic signal intersectionsas. The citywide traffic signal cleaning and painting program starts at Arvida Parkway and State Road 84. Residents can expect temporary lane closures at signalized intersections as they are painted, between the hours of 9am - 4pm.

Historic Visit to Weston

Famed Tuskegee Airman Ezra M. Hill Visits Tequesta Trace Middle School

It was neither the volume of his voice nor any especially entertaining and clever antics that captivated a room full of students at Tequesta Trace Middle School on February 11th. It was the heartfelt passion that former Tuskegee Airman Ezra Hill expressed and the historic significance of his story that enveloped his young audience.

Ezra Hill told the story of the Tuskegee Airmen: In 1941 after the attack on Pearl Harbor, most of our nation's naval carriers were gone, and the United States had to take to the air to fight during World War II. The U.S. needed trained pilots and African Americans in our armed services desired the opportunity to fly for their country, but it was a time in history when blacks could not participate in the Air Force since at the time, the military was segregated. For this reason, President Franklin Roosevelt was prodded by his wife Eleanor to establish a school where African Americans could learn to fly. A training program was created at the



Tuskegee Institute in Tuskegee, Alabama, and in the very hot summer of 1941, African Americans were given the opportunity they longed for. The Tuskegee Institute had been founded by Booker T. Washington in 1881 and had a strong civilian pilot training program. But even after graduating classes of pilots, the military would not allow African Americans to fly in combat until several years later, when



bomber escorts over Germany were having a 60% fatality rate. It was then that the Tuskegee Airmen were finally given their opportunity to fly in battle.

The Tuskegee Airmen flew 190 missions during World War II with no losses. On the last bomber missions to Berlin to end the war, the government was going to send white pilots to escort the bombers. The bomber crews of the 332nd requested the Tuskegee Airmen and after ten more missions, the war was over. It was 1945.

Ezra Hill came home from the war to segregation. He was an officer in the Air Force but still could not eat in the same restaurant as white people. Inspired by a superior officer, Ezra, who was a high school drop-out, went on to get his diploma, and then a bachelor's degree in Engineering. After he retired from the Air Force, he went on to attain a second degree in Computer Science and went back to work for the government for another 18 years. In 1948, due to the bravery and success of the Tuskegee Airmen, President Harry S. Truman desegregated the United States military.

Tuskegee Airman Ezra Hill visited Tequesta Trace Middle School in celebration of Black History Month with an amazing story of not only personal strength and determination, but one of historic proportions for our county. The faculty of Tequesta Middle presented Mr. Hill with a plaque of appreciation for what he did for our country in World War II and for what he continues to do today to inspire our youth. The advice presented by Mr. Hill this day to the students of Tequesta Trace Middle School – "Don't let anything stand in your way. No matter where you are in your life; no matter what people tell you – you can succeed."

The Weston Community Library

To benefit from Public Art & Design

In January, group of enthusiastic Weston residents came out on a rainy evening to meet with officials from Broward County's Cultural Division and the actual artists who have been commissioned to create the public art for Weston's new library. It was an interesting discussion of ideas and opinions, with the artists showing impressive samples of "public art" projects they have created throughout the state of Florida.

The Public Art & Design Program, established in 1976, is dedicated to enhancing the urban environment through the creation of commissioned works of art that create a sense of place, improve the visual environment, and advance the mission of the County.

In April, the Artist Selection Panel met for a design review. Artists Nitin Jayaswal and Margaret Tolbert provided a presentation of their design proposal for the Weston library. They proposed a series of graphic panels affixed near the top of the library's interior columns. The panels would utilize the process of lenticular 3D graphics – whereby adding dimension and motion to the printed imagery and allowing

the eye to simultaneously view alternating sections of two images. As a visitor to the library moved through the space while looking at these panels, the image would "flip" into another image, creating a sense of movement throughout the room.

The panel unanimously voted to approve the conceptual design proposal presented. The artists will now begin the process of collecting the photographs and paintings to be utilized on the 56 panels needed, which will attract the viewer as they move throughout the library. The artists advised staff that their January meeting in Weston had provided them with the information they needed to make their selections: themes of nature, especially the Everglades; history and the spirit of innovation which residents felt typify the development of Weston.

The new Broward County Weston Community Library site is located across from Cypress Bay High School on Bonaventure Blvd. at Vista Park Blvd. Currently construction is on schedule and the library system is looking forward to a possible opening in late fall 2005.



Weston Road Medians Have New Lush Look

The medians running down the center of Weston Road have a lush new look thanks to the completed Median Improvement Project which infused the length of Weston Road with Royal palms, Oaks, Foxtail palms, Jasmine, Juniper, Podocaspus and an array of other plant materials to provide a lushly landscaped exhibition of foliage.

The project was initiated to bring the Weston Road Medians up to par with the landscape standards of medians throughout the rest of Weston. The \$1.3 million five month construction project was completed in April.

New Dog Park Opens in Markham Park

A grand opening ceremony for the new Broward County dog park facility at Markham Park was held on Thursday, March 17th to an audience packed full of humans, and canines barking at the bit for the opportunity to pounce on the area's newest dog park. After the City of Weston's donation of \$50,000 toward the construction of the facility, Weston City Commissioners were on hand to help cut the ribbon on Broward County's largest dog park.

The new facility occupies 2.73 acres of Markham Park, just outside of Weston at the north end of Weston Road. The dog park has one section reserved for large dogs and another for smaller breeds. Bermuda sod, which provides a smooth and even surface for dogs to run and play on, is utilized throughout the facility. The turf is designed to minimize ticks and fleas.

For owners, wide paths were constructed for walking pets. Three shelters provide rest areas, two with refrigerated drinking fountains and separate fountains for pets, along with a centrally located dog washing area. Kids don't have it much better than this, as canine visitors are welcomed with a variety of colorful equipment to exercise and challenge their agility, such as Dog Logs, Walk-the-Plank, and Limbones.

Located at 16001 West State Road 84 in Sunrise, the dog park will be open during Markham Park's regular hours, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. during daylight-saving time. Dogs must be at least 4 months old and have proof of current rabies vaccination and license. Rules and regulations are posted at the entrance of the park. keep kids Safe This Summer!

Our kids love summer! No school, staying up late, and all day to play.

Unfortunately, 40 percent of all unintentional injury-related deaths occur from May to August.

The greatest summertime risks include drowning, bike crashes, falls, pedestrian incidents & motor vehicle crashes.

With this in mind, stick to the following safety tips all summer long to make sure kids are safe and happy:

Travel Safe!

- Make sure your kids are secured in the appropriate child safety seat or safety belt for their age and size.
- Kids should always be secured safely in the back seat.
- Call the Weston Police or Fire departments for a safety seat inspection.

Swim Safe!

- Always supervise young children near water, including pools, spas, toilets, bathtubs and buckets of water.
- Insist your children wear personal flotation devices when out on boats, near open bodies of water or participating in water sports.
- Remove toys from the pool when not in use. Toys can tempt kids to return to the water when you're not present.
- Consistently practice sun protection! Kids receive an average of three times more sun exposure than adults.

Play Safe!

- Always supervise your children at playgrounds or in the backyard. Ensure that they are on age appropriate equipment.
- Make sure your kids wear the correct, properly fitted

protective gear when they practice and play team sports!

Walk Safe!

- Never let your child under age 10 cross the street alone. Teach children to obey traffic rules.
- Make sure your kids wear reflective materials, and don't let them walk alone at night. If they must walk at dawn or at dusk, make sure they carry a flashlight.

Wheel Safe!

- Make sure your kids properly wear fitted helmets and other protective gear every time they ride their bikes, scooters, inline skates or skateboards.
- Be sure kids wear light colored clothing or reflective material.
- Teach your children the rules of the road and practice obeying traffic laws with them.

Store Safe!

- Make your house kid-friendly! Summer greatly increases the amount of time your kids spend at home.
- Properly contain and store all medicines, cleaning solutions and poisons where children cannot get to them.

Maintenance, improvements and upgrades are provided to preserve and enhance the superb quality of our Weston parks system. Recent and upcoming improvements include:

Vista Park - Completed and open for use! This \$6 million project, adjacent to Cypress Bay High School is located at 18800 Vista Park Boulevard.

Features include: 4 soccer/football fields, 4 baseball/softball fields, playground, and two concession/restroom buildings as well as sports lighting and parking for 500 vehicles. These fields will provide welcome relief to Weston's ever increasing demand for sports.

Weston Regional Park - Construction of a Roundabout at the park entrance, located at the intersection of South Post and Saddle Club Roads, is complete. Family YMCA - Located inside the Weston Regional Park, construction is currently underway on this \$7.5 million, 42,000+ square foot facility. As the dust clears, and a beautiful building emerges, completion of the YMCA is anticipated for mid to late summer 2005.

HURRICANE SAFETY

The only real defense is **PREPAREDNESS**. Below is a checklist of important steps to take and items to have on hand in a Disaster Survival Kit. We would also like residents to ensure that they are registered with the City's **CodeRED** Emergency Notification System (see info in this section), and new for this hurricane season, we want you to be aware that the City's website at www.westonfl.org will provide a listing of registered businesses that are open after a hurricane.

Special Needs Registry - If you are elderly, frail, or disabled and have no method of transportation to local shelters, assistance is available. However, only those individuals that have pre-registered will be eligible for transportation. Do not wait until the last minute. If you qualify or for more information, please call: Broward County Elderly & Veterans Services Division at (954) 537-2888.

HAVE A PLAN

- * Determine escape routes from your home and places to meet and also an out of area person to call, so all family members have a point of contact.
- * Make a plan for what to do with your pets (they cannot be taken to shelters).
- * Make an emergency communication plan for family members. It is very possible that you become separated (due to work or other issues); have a plan for getting back together. Have an out-of-state relative or friend serve as the "family contact", as it is often easier to reach someone long distance after a hurricane hits an area.
- * Post emergency telephone numbers by phones/Do children know when & how to call 911?
- * Check insurance policy now for hurricane and flood damage coverage. Once a Hurricane Watch is issued, insurance companies will not write any new policies or make adjustments to current policies.
- * Document your valuables by photographing/videotaping them. Keep records secure in a safety deposit box or waterproof unit.

WATCHES & WARNINGS

A hurricane watch is issued when there is a threat of hurricane conditions within 24-36 hours.

A hurricane warning is issued when hurricane conditions are expected in 24 hours or less. Hurricane conditions equal winds of 74 miles per hour or greater.

WHEN A STORM IS APPROACHING - Hurricane Watch issued

- * Secure all outside objects. Bring loose objects such as patio furniture, garden tools and planters, inside.
- * Protect your windows. Permanent shutters are the best protection. Plywood panels can be used: 1/2 inch plywood is best, cut to fit each window; mark which board fits which window; Pre-drill holes every 18 inches for screws.
- * Fill vehicle fuel tanks and generators
- *Turn refrigerator & freezer to the coldest setting.
- * Fill bathtubs and any large containers with water for washing, cleaning and flushing toilets, since electric power may go out of service.
- * If your cable is working, tune to channel 25 (Advanced Cable) or channel 78 (Comcast), for up-to-date City information on boil water orders, debris pickup and other related information.
- * TUNE YOUR CAR RADIO TO 1680AM for City emergency information, boil water orders and other important notifications such as debris pickup. The 1680 Emergency notification system will be operational even with a power outage for approximately four (4) days.

DISASTER SURVIVAL KIT

Emergency supplies should be adequate to last at least 3 days. A 10-day supply of water, food and medicine is recommended.

Water At least 1 gallon per person for each day.

Food Canned or packaged, pre-cooked foods for 3-7 days / Non-electric can opener

Clothes/blankets Change of clothes/rain gear/shoes/blankets or sleeping bags

Medicines/First Aid Prescription medications, equipment, eyeglasses and first aid supplies

Fire Extinguisher Dry chemical, type ABC

Radio Battery operated with backup batteries

Flashlights And extra batteries and bulbs

Cash Banks and ATM's may not be open for a period of time

Safety/Tools Keep a set of tools with you/trash bags/chlorine/soap/tarp/rope/ broom/pen & paper

Toiletries/Specialty Items Hygiene items/Baby supplies / Moisture wipes/Pet food supplies

FOR CITY INFORMATION AFTER A STORM:

CodeRED Emergency Notification System: This high-speed telephone notification system will be employed when necessary to notify residents of essential information. Calls received from the CodeRED system come up on caller I.D. as 999-999-9999. If you see this number, please do not disconnect.

Many people change cell phone numbers or move during the year and this is a great time to ensure that our data system has your current contact information.

Las condiciones huracanadas se manifiestan por vientos de un mínimo de 74 millas por hora.

- * Refuerce todos los objetos afuera de su casa. Traiga por adentro objetos sueltos como muebles de patio, herramientas y tiestos.

New York Follows Suit

Passes Defibrillator Law

eston became the first city in Florida to require Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) in businesses and restaurants of a certain size, when the ordinance was adopted back in September of 2004 and since that time, cities around South Florida and across the country, including New York City, have followed suit and now require AEDs in many public and private locations.

Weston's ordinance allowed six months, until March 2005, for affected owners of city office buildings, hotels, gyms, restaurants, churches and other locations to purchase and install the devices.

What an AED does:

An AED or Automated external defibrillator is a portable device which uses an electric shock to restart the heart. Diagrams and step-by-step automated voice instructions walk a person through its use. The pads placed on a victim use digital technology to analyze the heart's rhythm to determine whether a shock is needed - the equipment will not send a shock if a heartbeat is detected.

In cardiac arrest, victim survival rates are reduced by approximately 10% for every minute that passes. Very few victims survive after 10 minutes, making immediate access to a defibrillator so important. It is important to note that the public should always call 911 first, and then employ the defibrillation devise.

Around the World in Weston

Multiculturalism has become a tradition in Weston, as demonstrated by the 7th annual Around the World in Weston Festival, held this past January in Weston Town Center Park.

"Harvey Borris, consul at the Trinidad & Tobago consulate general in Miami, sponsored and supported a steel drum act at the festival when another fell through," Love said. "We are making a name and good connections."




CYPRESS BAY BALLFIELDS SEE THE LIGHT!

Cypress Bay High School baseball and softball fields now have lights. This means that home games can be played at night - a very exciting and long-awaited feature of the school's sports program.

The City encourages night sports activities at the school as a way of developing a sense of community in Weston. At most schools, night athletic activities draw larger crowds than afternoon games. Until now, Cypress Bay's home baseball and softball games have

been held at 4pm to take advantage of daylight.

At its December 6, 2004 meeting, the Weston City Commission authorized the expenditure of \$344,201 to install these lights. A similar measure was approved by the Commission for the Cypress Bay football field last year, approving \$400,000 toward lighting and stadium seating. The school hosted its first-ever night football game on October 23rd.



Improvements Will Help Ease Congestion

The City of Weston, in a joint project with the Florida Department of Transportation and Broward County, is proceeding with construction of modifications to the I-75 south-bound off-ramp with westbound Arvida Parkway.

Easier to Make a Left Turn at Weston Road

The primary benefit is that the southbound off-ramp traffic will be able to maneuver to the left-turn lanes at Weston Road without having to weave through oncoming traffic within a short distance.

The improvements include removing the merge section of the southbound off-ramp and realigning the ramp at almost 90-degrees with westbound Arvida Parkway. The existing single-lane off-ramp will be converted to a long set of dual right-turn lanes which will prevent back-ups onto mainline I-75. The re-aligned T-shaped intersection will be signalized and interconnected to the Arvida Parkway/Weston Road signal, for coordinated signal operations. The traffic signal will then

"meter" the traffic flow between the off-ramp and westbound Arvida Parkway based on demand.

Similarly, westbound traffic on Arvida Parkway will not have to worry about potential merging conflicts from off-ramp traffic. The traffic signal will eliminate the merging maneuver between the two off-ramps.

Permits have been issued, and mast arms ordered for the signalized lights, but this is a complex project that will take nearly one year to complete. At a cost of almost \$900,000, approximately 60% of which is being paid by the state, this improvement project will supply much needed relief to the congestion caused by the off-ramp traffic.

Daily traffic should be minimally impacted during construction as the current ramp will remain open while the new ramp configuration is built and connected to Arvida Parkway. It is anticipated that the off-ramp modifications project will be completed in early 2006.



Utility Bill Has New Look

Your utility bill, which is remitted by the City of Sunrise, has a new look incorporating several enhanced features:

- An area for utility consumption comparisons has been added to allow customers to view changes in usage consumption from one year to the next. Customers with multiple meters will have their total usage reflected in this area.
- Account payment delinquency information will appear in the dark blue shaded area, designed to help draw

the customer's attention so that any problems with the account can be addressed before corrective action is taken by the City.

- The shaded "Messages" box has been expanded to give the City more flexibility in the amount and type of information provided to customers.
- The detachable payment coupon has been moved to the bottom of the statement and, for ease in mailing, the return mail information is now printed on both sides of the stub to ensure that the City's mailing address information appears correctly through the return envelope window.



Following the Cass of Weston University

In January, student's spent the day with the Broward Sheriff's Office Department of Fire Rescue and Emergency Services. Every student had an opportunity to make the precarious climb up the aerial truck's 105' ladder; don fire gear and attempt to navigate an obstacle course with a bag over their head – simulating the diminished visual capabilities in a real fire; and prepared a patient for transport to the hospital. All of this was after students discussed budgets, staffing and equipment purchases, with the Fire Chief and staff.

At the offices of Calvin, Giordano & Associates (CGA), the City's contract provider for planning and engineering services, students discovered dozens of job possibilities that they had not contemplated before. Visiting CGA in February, the

firm has over 100 employees, providing students the chance to view a wide range of career opportunities including land-scape architecture, surveying, engineering, 3D graphic artist and much more. Students also gained valuable practice for their upcoming City Commission Simulation, by selecting roles and simulating the legislative process for a site plan approval. There were stumbles and plenty of laughs along the way, but who says government can't be fun!
