

What Does It Mean For Weston?

The voters in the State of Florida, with their approval of Amendment 1 on January 29, 2008, have many people asking, "What does this mean for Weston?"

As we have written in the past, it is important to realize that the City of Weston's ad-valorum tax rate is the lowest in Broward County and one of the lowest in the State. That's the good news. However, it also means that we only represent a very small part of your overall property tax bill each year, about 7% of the total. Therefore, the added Homestead exemption to a total of \$50,000 as it affects the Weston portion of your tax bill will only result in a small savings, of about \$34 per home over previous years, assuming we maintain the same overall tax rate.

You will realize savings from the increased Homestead from Broward County, the hospital and water management districts, and the other taxing authorities, assuming they keep the same ad valorem rate for the upcoming year. School Boards have been exempted, so no savings will be realized, with the State continuing to decrease its share of funding for education, school boards may have no choice but to increase their property taxes to maintain services. As the leadership in Tallahassee takes credit for reducing real estate taxes, they continue to shift the burden onto local property owners to properly fund education.

"Portability", which was also passed as part of the Amendment, should help people move, either to upsize, downsize, or simply relocate, without the significant increases in property taxes that otherwise could have occurred. The cost of portability to Weston, and other agencies is really unknown, and very difficult to predict. Clearly, with people moving into the City and paying lower taxes due to their ability to bring Continued on page 2

their exemption, there will be a fiscal impact, but it will take a couple of years of experience to be able to accurately predict this impact. The bigger question is the impact of the current downturn of the real estate market and reduction of assessed values. This is difficult to predict, and until better known, we will treat it as being material.

We anticipate that revenue for Weston will decrease for our 2008/2009 Fiscal Year, however we believe it will be manageable. Last year, we took steps to reduce expenses, and further reductions may be needed. While we realize that people enjoy some of the "discretionary" services, this clearly is the area where decreases may need to be made. We do not anticipate that any reductions to essential services will be needed in the near future. Our police, fire, recreation, landscaping, road maintenance services and the like are what separate Weston from being just an average community. We have been very diligent over the past decade to save for a rainy day, and make sure our financial picture is very secure. That conservative approach will serve us well during these more challenging financial times.

It remains to be seen what the full impact of the passage of Amendment 1 will have on Florida's real estate market, as our downturn is just a part of the national downturn. As the Legislature and the Governor will no doubt continue to address Florida's tax issues, the state's Budget and Tax Reform Commission has the opportunity to independently place its recommended tax reform measures on the November 2008 ballot for voter consideration.

Stay informed and get involved. Write, call, or email the Governor and your legislators. Let them know how you feel about tax reform and the impact it may have on your home, your schools, and your local government essential services.

On a very positive note, we extend a warm welcome to our newest member, Commissioner Angel Gomez, joining us on the dais. Commissioner Gomez took office on February 4, 2008, after running un-opposed to fill the Seat Area One vacancy. Welcome aboard Commissioner Gomez.

On behalf of Commissioner Stermer, Commissioner Chermak, Commissioner Henriksson, and Commissioner Gomez, it is our privilege to serve you, and as always, we're only a phone call or email away.

A Note From the City Manager

"Securing Our Sustainability" is the theme for our upcoming annual Performance Report, which will be included in the next edition of the Weston Announcer. This theme is most appropriate in light of the property tax reform measures enacted by the 2007 Legislature, the passage of Amendment 1 in January 2008, and the anticipation of further property tax reform coming from the 2008 Legislative Session and the Budget and Tax Reform Commission.

Our sustainability depends on our ability to work with the revenues available as affected by these tax reform measures and to assure that we continue to deliver our essential services and maintain our infrastructure. Without doing so, we can not secure our sustainability.

Having this knowledge, we have already begun the processes to meet this challenge. Last summer we not only looked at our costs of doing business, we looked at how we were doing business. Working with our service providers, we were able restructure our management and service delivery in ways that both improved our business practices and reduced our costs of doing business. Our amended agreements with Calvin, Giordano and Associates, Inc. (for Planning, Zoning, Engineering, and Public Works services), and Municipal Technologies, LLC (for Administrative and Information Technology services),

along with our new agreements with the Sheriff of Broward County for Police Services, and for Emergency Medical, Fire Protection, and Fire Prevention Services will put us in good stead to adapt to this new environment.

Our agreement with All Service, Inc. for solid waste, recycling and bulk trash collection services was recently renegotiated and extended. The changes in the agreement, among others, provide for automated residential curbside collection beginning October 1st, and one of the lowest automated curbside collection rates in Broward County. In September, residences will be provided with a 95 gallon rolling cart in which to place their garbage. On collection day the cart will be wheeled to the curbside for automated collection by a specially equipped truck. This method will enable All Service to contain costs well into the future. We will be providing full information to residents via mail, our cable channel, web site and radio station in August prior to the delivery of the carts and implementation of the new system.

The Davie Commons project, should it be built, is one that would affect our sustainability. The City continues to oppose this project as all of the traffic impacts would occur in Weston and none in Davie. Such impacts would require us to add ten deputies to manage the traffic at a cost of \$1.35 million for the first year in today's dollars, and increasing every year thereafter. If the City in the future is limited as to the amount of revenues it can generate, the impact would go unmanaged or law enforcement resources would have to be taken from the City's residential areas. The developer's latest strategy is to sponsor charitable events in the City apparently to convince our residents that Weston should not object to the project. Instead, the developer should be using this benevolent corporate citizenship to convince the Town of Davie that it take responsibility for the traffic impacts from a project that only it will benefit from.

We've all chosen to live here, and open businesses here, in part because we have managed to sustain the high quality of our essential services and infrastructure. Over the course of the next few months we will learn what the future may hold as to further property tax reform and its impact on our City's ability to maintain our essential services and infrastructure at the levels we have come to expect. Please know that we are all wholly committed to "Securing Our Sustainability."

Unbeknownst to most residents, Weston has quietly become a favorite filming location for print, television, video and motion pictures. This clean, quiet industry has been utilizing our city for many years, with interest increasing yearly.

The film and television industry is one that makes use of locations for short periods of time, usually with minimal disruption, while hiring local and regional talent, purchasing hotel rooms, vehicle and equipment rentals, food and more; locations utilized, such as private homes or businesses, most often receive compensation for their use.

A sampling of productions filmed in Weston:

Any Given Sunday (1999), a Warner Brothers film starring Al Pacino, Dennis Quaid, Cameron Diaz and Jamie Fox, filmed in Windmill Ranches.

2 Fast 2 Furious (2003) by Universal, with Paul Walker, Eva Mendes and Cole Hauser, utilizing US 27 and I-75 for car scenes.

In 2007, a new 8-part MTV reality series called "**The Paper**" was filmed at Cypress Bay High School, featuring

seven staff members of the schools award-winning newspaper, The Circuit; **Bart's Got A Room** starring William Macy and Cheryl Hines had minor portions of the film set in Weston at the Hyatt Hotel; a segment for the cable TV series **AT&T's Homepage** with Dionne Sanders and Jay Feely; and television commercials including **BMW**.

Road Movie by Summit Entertainment starring James Marsden and Amanda Crew, used Weston's SW 26th Street for filming car scenes and Amish buggy riding and U.S. 27 and the truck stop for staging a carnival scene. The City also recently assisted a highly successful Hollywood studio with location scouting for the filming of an upcoming major motion picture which would be shot this spring.

Over the past ten years, numerous movies, TV and reality shows, videos and commercials have been filmed throughout the City, taking advantage of Weston's extensively landscaped roadways, well maintained properties, and film friendly atmosphere.

AUTOMATIC CPR: PRESENTING THE AUTOPULSE

Weston continues its proud tradition of offering cutting edge technology. In December 2007, Rescue Unit No. 81 received AutoPulse, a new, more effective alternative to manual CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) for victims of Sudden Cardiac Arrest. This revolutionary, non-invasive devise moves blood more consistently than is possible with human hands. Easy to use and battery operated, its load-distributing LifeBand squeezes the

entire chest. As a result, victims receive consistent, high-quality compressions that deliver improved blood flow. All of Weston's firefighters and paramedics have received the required training course to operate the AutoPulse. Utilized for the first time in January 2008 it proved to be 100% effective. The City is looking forward to receiving its second AutoPulse which has already been ordered.



A recent review of all Weston parks by an ADA (American with Disabilities Act) consultant revealed that the current playground surfaces comprised of sand and mulch are not ADA compliant. Signed into federal law on July 26, 1990, the ADA is wide-ranging legislation intended to make American society more accessible to people with disabilities. All city and county governments are covered by the ADA as "public entities" requiring all activities, services, and programs, including parks and recreation departments, to be ADA compliant.

In order to comply with ADA requirements, Weston's parks are being re-surfaced with SAF DEK, a poured in place rubber manufactured from 75% recycled rubber. Utilized by McDonald's and Disney World, SAF DEK is an industry leader in recreational safety surfaces. SAF DEK has already been installed at Weston's Regional Park and the City plans

to complete two playgrounds each fiscal year; Emerald Estates and Tequesta Trace Parks are next on the list. While meeting ADA requirements the surface is also toddler friendly in that it is softer with no abrasive qualities like mulch or asphalt.

Weston Receives a Perfect Rating NPDES

(National Pollution Discharge Elimination System) **Permit**

Each year the City of Weston is required by Interlocal Agreement to be one of the 30 co-permitees in Broward County for the NPDES (National Pollution Discharge Elimination System) Permit. To comply with the requirements of the permit the City must implement a comprehensive storm-water management program to reduce the number of pollutants that enter the water bodies within the City.

The goal of the NPDES program is to reduce the amount of pollutants entering the waters of the U.S. Based upon the review of the permit report, the City of Weston is one of the 30 co-permitees to completely satisfy the annual reporting requirements as specified by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection; less than 10 other co-permitees received a perfect rating. The City of Weston has and will continue to promote public participation to improve water quality by educating residents about proper swale and lawn maintenance.



New Bonaventure Stormwater Pump Stations

State and Federal Grants Saving Residents From Impact of Projected \$4 million Cost

The two stormwater pump stations that currently service the Bonaventure Development District (BDD), the area encompassing the Bonaventure section of Weston, are over 30-years old, perform well below capacity, and are obsolete. The purpose of the stations is to transfer water from Bonaventure's lake and canal system to the North New River Canal. The pumps provide essential flood control for the residents and businesses located in the Bonaventure basin.

The City had replacement pump stations designed incorporating new features to help alleviate flooding and to also prevent pollutants from entering the North New River, as a part of the City's ongoing plan to address flood protection, and environmental issues associated with stormwater.

The City's original cost projection for the project was \$4.3 million, which would have been assessed to the property

With the installation of the new system, the Bonaventure Development District stations will work with the efficiency of the newer ITDD system, providing greatly enhanced protection from stormwater flooding.

owners in the BDD. Bids for the two stations came in at \$3.3 million. Fortunately, through the efforts of city staff and our elected Legislative officials, State Representative Franklin Sands, Senator Nan Rich and Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz, the City has been notified of three grant/funding allocations to date:

Two, \$1 million grants from the South Florida Water Management District; and a \$492,000 federal appropriation from Congress, totaling \$2,492,000.00

The City is also currently pursuing \$1.35 million in funding from FEMA

Replacement of the two pumps stations includes demolition of existing structures, site work, purchase and installation of 6 new pumps, 2 generators and new buildings to protect the stations during hurricanes. Project construction is expected to take one year.

The additional funding above the \$3.3 million bid price will allow the city to upgrade the culverts in the area, which are the underground passageways that connect to the lakes and the outfalls. This work, originally to be completed over the next five years along with other drainage projects, will further enhance public health, safety and environmental benefits, with residents receiving a first rate drainage system to protect the homes and businesses they have invested in.

The City of Weston contracts with the Broward Sheriff's Office for Fire Rescue and Emergency Services, and is extremely proud of the job these men and women do each day. The firefighters at Fire Station No. 67 recently illustrated their level of skill when they were called to quick action by an unexpected visitor.

On November 19, 2007 Savanna residents Mr. Roberto Rivera Jr. and Mrs. Dorcas Rivera, who was in labor, were in route to Memorial West hospital. When Mrs. Rivera realized that she couldn't make it to the hospital, her husband stopped at Station No. 67. Within minutes Lieutenant Kevin Donnelly and Captain Guy Lindauer along with their crews, successfully delivered her baby girl in a rescue unit in the station's parking lot. After the birth of Alanis Carolina Rivera, 7 lbs, 13 oz, mother and daughter were safely transported to Memorial West hospital by Rescue Unit 67.

On Saturday, December 22, 2007, Mr. and Mrs. Rivera along with their two children Roberto Alejandro 5 years old and Sophia Naomi 4 years old and their new sister Alanis Carolina paid a visit to Fire Station No. 67 to thank the firefighters and have them sign a family picture as a

memento of their extraordinary efforts.

The BSO Fire Rescue Department provides services to the City's residents from three strategically located, City-owned stations, operated 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Additional services are provided to residents and groups such as:

- Public tours of fire stations
- Walk-in blood pressure checks
- Residential Fire Escape Plans
- Child Safety Seat Inspections
- Community Education Programs and demonstrations on fire prevention and safety
- Automatic External Defibrillator inspections and placement assistance for businesses
- C.E.R.T. (Citizens Emergency Response Team)
- All stations are a "Safe Haven for Newborns" per Florida Legislation; a mother may leave her unharmed newborn, up to 3 days old, at a hospital emergency room or fire/ EMS station, anonymously, and free from the fear of prosecution.

Weston City Hall A permanent home unveiled

On December 5th, 2007, City Commissioners unveiled to the community Weston's new, permanent city hall. Hundreds were in attendance for the Ribbon Cutting and Grand Opening Celebration of the City's newest facility, ten years to the date of the grand opening of Weston's first city hall office suite, a leased space now replaced with a permanent home.

Residents, guests and elected officials enjoyed refreshments and listened to live jazz outside the new \$6 million facility.

The evening's formal presentations began with the raising of an American flag, which had been given to the City by former Commissioner Edwin Jacobson. The flag had been flown over our nation's capital in honor of his 70th birthday, and today flies over city hall. After recognitions of those involved in the buildings design and construction, the City Commission had the honor of cutting the ribbon and welcoming guests to tours of the facility.

was held on July 4, 1996 and city staff moved into the facility in late September of 2007. City Hall is a 14,000 square foot structure on 3.5 acres located at 17200 Royal Palm Boulevard, adjacent to the Weston Police and Fire Stations. It includes: eleven offices, two conference rooms, copy/production room, reception desk, food & beverage area, voice/data server room, and an expansive lobby area which includes two public computer stations to access city codes; areas have energy conserving lighting sensors which turn lights on or off dependent upon motion in the room.

The Commission Chamber has 154 theater style seats and 61" plasma screens for the audience and commission and a control room for camera, sound and lighting equipment. Sound attenuating materials are utilized on the walls. The entire building has hurricane glass windows and an integrated backup power supply so that city operations can continue during power failures. The lobby was designed so if needed, additional temporary offices could be set up in an emergency, with power and data lines available for multiple stations.









On the Road with Weston University Police, Community Services and Fire/EMS

It's been a busy couple of months for Weston University's Class of 08' as they progress through the city's major departments.

Students spent the day with the Broward Sheriff's Office in November, learning what it takes to staff a 24/7 operation, along with the multitude of career opportunities that are available in such a large organization. They participated in a self-defense class, visited the BSO Aviation department, were shown a display by SWAT members and toured the mounted patrol horse barn.

In December, students tried their hand at designing a park, which as they found out, was not just fun and games... They also toured a Weston mitigation area, several parks, and were provided insight into how and why specific trees are removed or planted to maintain and enhance the city's tree canopy.

Students also viewed and were educated on the stormwater pump system which keeps Weston from flooding, and the annual flushing of the hydrant system.

Suiting up with oxygen and masks, students got a small taste of what firefighters must deal with when gearing up to fight a fire. They also climbed an aerial ladder and had hands-on EMS demonstrations. Prior to getting to the "fun" stuff, students learned about the economic costs and staffing difficulties associated with a fire rescue department. The Fire Marshal explained how the fire department is involved in every commercial building that is built in the city, from the ground up, ensuring all life safety issues are met. Students then toured the 9-1-1 communications department in Fort Lauderdale where all calls, emergency and non-emergency, are dispatched for both fire and police.



The Parks Report

Library Park Construction

With 13 municipal parks and the Weston Tennis Center, Weston residents have the chance to enjoy an array of amenities for every age and lifestyle. The Community Services Department is constantly assessing the equipment and fields at every facility. Maintenance, improvements and upgrades are provided to preserve and enhance the superb quality of our Weston parks system.

Improvements include:

Tequesta Trace Park and Emerald Estates Park – The playgrounds at these two parks will be closed temporarily in the coming months as the ground cover is replaced with new, poured-in-place rubberized surfacing. The surface was introduced at the Weston Regional Park in the late fall. Poured-in-place rubber provides for a safe, consistent surface that will limit injuries due to falls while providing for greater accessibility.

Weston Regional Park – The skatepark is open to the public for skateboarding and inline skating. Participants must wear helmet, elbow pads and knee pads. Participants under the age 17 must have a parent sign a waiver form available at the Community Center or online at the City website: www.westonfl.org

Library Park – Construction continues and many of the structures are now visible to passersby. Located next to the Weston Branch Library the park is expected to be completed by summer.

Reminders: Children should have adult supervision while on the City's playgrounds. Please help prevent injury:

- Don't wear clothes with drawstrings or other strings at the playground. Drawstrings, purses, and necklaces could get caught on play equipment;
- Don't wear bicycle helmets while on the playground;
- Shoes should remain on while playing.

While most of the Weston playgrounds are covered with shade structures and the new play surfacing is designed to resist heat retention, we are in South Florida and adults should check the temperatures on the equipment, particularly on hot summer days. Even with the shade structures, sunscreen should be worn.

Heading to Argentina

For the second year, a City of Weston staff member has had the great fortune to be selected by Rotary District 6990, which includes the Weston Rotary Club, to participate in their international exchange program. Laurie Menekou, the City's new Assistant Director of Communications will be going to Buenos Aires, Argentina from mid-March to mid-April.

Water Conservation

It all Starts with you

South Florida is under a declared extreme water shortage and the South Florida Water Management District has instituted a one-day-a-week watering schedule for residential landscape irrigation to conserve our water supplies.

WHY IS THIS NECESSARY?

- South Florida has had two years of below-average rainfall, which would normally recharge (or refill) our drinking water well fields.
- Lake Okeechobee water levels are at a record low, which is the primary source of water for communities, regional farms and a backup supply source for South Florida.
- Both surface and ground water levels are unseasonably low and showing a decline.
- A threat of saltwater intrusion exists when freshwater levels are low as this allows heavier saltwater to move inland. If they become contaminated, these freshwater sources that are tapped by wells may become unusable for years.
 - **The restrictions are needed to help protect our drinking water sources by maintaining the necessary levels of freshwater in the system**

Outdoor irrigation limits generate the largest water savings because it accounts for half of all household water use, but voluntary conservation practices both indoors and out are encouraged. It all starts with you.

The City of Weston provides Weekly Water Tips on our AM radio station 1680AM and government cable channel - so tune in... saving water not only helps save our environment but will save you money as well.

SOME SIMPLE STEPS TO SAVING WATER:

- If you have a swimming pool, consider a new watersaving pool filter. A single backflushing with a traditional filter uses 180 to 250 gallons of water.
- Avoid purchasing recreational water toys which require a constant stream of water.
- Don't pour half empty glasses or pots of water down the drain - use it to water indoor plants. You can do the same by collecting water used to wash produce in the sink.
- Repair dripping faucets by replacing washers. One drop per second wastes 2,700 gallons of water a year! Check outdoor faucets as well.
- Operate dishwashers and clothes washers only when they are full you can save 1,000 gallons a month.
- Don't let the water run turn it off while shaving.





Established in 1982, the program cites only 300 schools per year out of 133,000 that are either academically superior or that demonstrate dramatic gains in student achievement to high levels.
