
Summary of Projects and Services

Weston residents and its business community can look forward to the following:

- No increase in the ad valorem tax rate
- Additional BSO Lieutenant and Sergeants
- A fourth EMS/Transport Unit
- Streamlined annual fire inspections
- Construction of a City Hall
- Development of Library Park
- Improvements to Three Village/Country Isles Roads
- Improvements to Manatee Isles Drive
- Improvements to Tequesta Trace Park
- Construction of new Bonaventure Storm Water Pumps
- Construction of a Public Works/Disaster Services Center
- Implementation of Priority One of the 2006 Master Re-Landscaping Plan

The City has approved an agreement with Arena Development Corporation for the design of an ice and sports arena to be located at the north end of Vista Park. Within the next few months the City Commission will make its final determination, dependant upon costs, whether to move forward with construction.

Our goal for Fiscal Year 2007 is to place the City in the best position possible to prepare for and respond to the future events requiring emergency management, and at the same time to continue to maintain and enhance the value of the City.

2007 Homestead Application Pre-Filings Taken at Weston Community Center

All Florida residents are eligible for a Homestead Exemption on their residence, which provides a tax-saving exemption on the first \$25,000 of the assessed value of an owner-occupied residence, and caps taxable value annual increases at not greater than 3%.

I-75 Off-Ramp Traffic Signal Operational

The traffic signal and new I-75 southbound off-ramp to Royal Palm Boulevard is complete. With little fanfare, the long-awaited signal became operational on September 14th. For anyone utilizing this entryway from I-75 the new ramp and signal is a blessing. The primary benefit is that southbound off-ramp traffic can now maneuver easily and safely to the left-turn lanes at Weston Road.

The improvements included removing the merge section of the southbound off-ramp and realigning the ramp at almost 90 degrees with westbound Royal Palm Boulevard. The previously existing single-lane off-ramp was converted to a long set of dual right-turn lanes, minimizing back-ups onto mainline I-75. The re-aligned T-shaped intersection was signalized and interconnected to the Royal Palm Blvd./Weston Road signal, for coordinated signal operations. The traffic signal will now "meter" the traffic flow between the off-ramp and westbound Royal Palm Boulevard based on demand.

The completion of the signal had been delayed for many months due to Hurricane Wilma and the resulting demand placed upon signal installation installers. With the signal complete, residents and visitors should enjoy a much less stressful and much smoother entry into our city.

A Note From the City Manager

If you participated in the November 2006 municipal election, you made history! The November 2006 election for seats on Weston's City Commission marked an historical event in Weston's brief ten year existence and in the existence of Broward County as well. It was the first time since 1975 that elections for municipal officials in Broward County were held concurrent with the federal election cycle occurring in November.

Prior to 1975 each Broward municipality was free to choose when its elections for its respective municipal officials would occur, and they occurred in almost every month of the calendar. As more cities were created in Broward more elections occurred and it soon became confusing to Broward voters when it was time to elect municipal officials in their city. To eliminate this confusion, in 1975 the state legislature and the Governor enacted a law that mandated all elections for municipal officials in Broward County occur in March.

While the March election cycle consolidated all of the elections for municipal officials in Broward County, it separated these elections from those on the November federal election cycle. This well intentioned action of the state legislature and governor

resulted in higher election costs to the taxpayers of these municipalities for having to hold their elections in March and not being able to share these costs with a November election, and extremely low voter turnout as most voters associate elections with the month of November.

Recognizing the desire for obtaining the greatest voter participation possible and minimizing costs of elections to the City's taxpayers; in October 2003 the City of Weston took a leadership role and filed a bill in the 2004 session of the Florida Legislature to enable the City and all of Broward's municipalities to choose whether to maintain their March election cycle or change to the November even year election cycle. The Florida House of Representatives and Florida Senate approved Weston's bill in May 2004, and the Governor signed the bill enacting it into law shortly thereafter. November elections for municipal officials were now a possibility.

In July 2004, the City Commission approved placing a question on the November 2004 ballot asking the City's voters whether they wanted to amend the City's Charter to change from the previously mandated March election cycle to the newly permitted November even year cycle. In crafting the ballot question, the question was when this was to take effect. For this change to take effect in November 2006, the two members of the City Commission who were elected to a four year term in March 2003 would have to forfeit the last four and one-half months of their elected term, to which they graciously did. Weston's voters went to the poles on Election Day November 2004 and approved the Charter amendment changing Weston elections for municipal officials to November beginning in 2006.

So if you voted in the November 2006 municipal election, congratulations, you made history!

Congratulations also go to Commissioner Stermer and Commissioner Chermak for winning their respective re-elections and being Weston's first Commission members elected in a November election.





A Very Interesting Year

This was a very interesting year for local government. With real estate prices soaring over the past few years, taxes on property, both commercial and residential has risen dramatically. Local governments have been under increased pressure to hold the line on spending, lower taxes, and yet the demand for governmental services has not diminished. Residents do not want to cut back on police, fire, EMS, parks or road improvements. Schools, libraries and other county services are in peak demand. It's a balancing act that requires significant consideration and thought before making decisions.

In Weston, our total revenues for fiscal year 2007 are up 5.50% over 2006, while expenditures are projected to rise 3.40%, generally in line with the increase in cost of living. Since most of our contracts call for a 5% annual increase, primarily to cover increases in wages, this increase in expenditures over last year is very modest. In addition to covering the contract increases, the budget will fund additional police officers, an additional EMS unit, development of Library Park and the Ice & Sports complex (if approved), improvements to Tequesta Park and several roadways, as well as funding the construction of City Hall and our Public Works and Disaster Services Center.

Since the vast majority of our residents have the Homestead Exemption, and the City has maintained the same tax rate, as we have done for the past 10 years, increases are limited to the 3% maximum rise in their property value. Where non-homestead residents and businesses are feeling the pinch is that while the tax rate is the same, their values have risen dramatically, causing significant cost increases in their tax liability. Unfortunately, since the revenue needs to be there, any significant shift that would assist non-homesteaded property would result in a shift to those with the Homestead Exemption. This could tax long-term residents out of their own homes, which clearly isn't an acceptable solution.

In addition to ongoing expenses, we must continue to build reserves for a rainy (or windy) day. Last year we utilized reserves to respond quickly to the hurricane cleanup needs, and the need for such reserves had never been so apparent.

Financially, the City of Weston is very strong, and we will continue to manage our finances in a manor consistent with meeting our long term goals. For the past 10 years, we have been able to do all of this without ever raising the ad valorem tax rate. We expect that trend to continue for some time to come.

There has been much talk about Homestead portability, doubling the Homestead exemption, capping overall taxes, and the like. Some reforms are needed, but

governments will need to fund their operations, so any changes in the structure could have a profound impact. As you know in your

own lives, you simply can not continue to pay your expenses yet reduce your earnings. Lost revenues will have to be made up elsewhere. While some of these proposed measures might not be bad for Weston since we are in such good financial shape, other governments, which make

up over 90% of your tax bill, might very well have to increase their tax rates to account for the lost revenue.

There has been much discussion about the rising property values, and therefore increased revenue to government. That might be true in some governments, but in Weston, our ad valorem taxes account for only 35% of all of our General Fund revenue, and only about 11% of all revenue. To the extent that increased revenue over the years has been as a result of Weston's increasing population, that growth has resulted in a need for additional police services and more parks, resulting in more expenditures despite not raising the tax rate. So the real question everyone should be asking every governmental agency is: How much more are you SPENDING this year verses last year, and what exactly are we getting for that increased spending?

With only a 3.4% increase in expenditures over last year while providing more services as described earlier, we continue to be in excellent shape.

On behalf of Commissioner Stermer, Commissioner Chermak, Commissioner Cheren and Commissioner Henriksson, we will all be carefully watching the proposals at the state level to try to encourage solutions to some of the problems associated with rising real estate taxes, as well as the problems in obtaining and paying for property insurance. We will weigh in at all levels of government on your behalf, and we will make certain that our voices are heard, arguing that changes ultimately benefit all taxpayers, not simply shift the burden from one to another.

- Link to city web site for viewing non-video screens

The system still provides the same background music as the former system, which many in our community have called to say they enjoy.

The City cable channel provides information on city services, departments, events, recreational programs and more. City Commission meetings are broadcast live and then replayed over the next two weeks. During an emergency, posted information is suspended and emergency notifications are broadcast.

The Parks Report

With 12 municipal parks and the Weston Tennis Library Park – The City received a \$200,000 park grant Center, the Community Services Department is constantly assessing the equipment and fields at every facility. Maintenance, improvements and upgrades are provided to preserve and enhance the superb quality of our Weston parks system. Recent and upcoming improvements include:

Weston Regional Park - Repairs to the shade covers have been completed and the planting of new trees should take place during the next few months.

Tequesta Trace Park – Repairs to the shade covers have been completed, and the design for new entry gates and landscape improvements including a sports equipment storage building are still underway.

Vista Park – Repairs to the shade covers have been completed.

from the State of Florida thru the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP). The grant money will assist with the overall development cost of Library Park. The grant check was presented to the City of Weston at the August 21 City Commission meeting from Senator Nan Rich, State Representative Franklin Sands and State Representative Susan Goldstein. Design work for the park is being finalized so the project can be advertised for competitive bids. Construction work should begin after the first of the year.

Windmill Ranch Park - New walkways around the playground area were constructed by the Broward County School Board.

Other Parks - Repairs to the shade covers at Country Isles, Emerald Estates, Gator Run, Heron, Indian Trace and Windmill Ranch parks have been completed.

Cypress Bay High School Football Stadium - The City assisted in the funding and construction of additional bleachers to the high school stadium seating, which was completed and in use for the opening game of the high school football season.


Longtime Law **Enforcement Officer** Takes a New Road



OPERATION SAFE SCHOOLS in its 7th Year

BSO DESIGNED CAMPUS CRISIS PLANS LOADED ONTO DEPUTY LAPTOPS

The dramatic pictures shown here of a SWAT Team exercise were taken at Falcon Cove Middle School back in 2001 during one of numerous crisis training exercises that the Sheriff's Office has held after development of its Operation Safe Schools program in 1999. During this exercise, Deputies and SWAT Team members made their way through the maze of school hallways and classrooms, expertly guiding students to safety, and ultimately apprehending their "suspect".

With so many school tragedies in the news over the past

few months, it is comforting to know that the Broward Sheriff's Office has had tools in place for many years to assist in the event of a school emergency. Every BSO deputy has immediate access to contact numbers, interior and exterior photographs, aerial photos and detailed floor plans for all Broward County public schools and many private schools in the county. Every school, public and private in the City of Weston is on the program.

Loaded onto laptops in BSO vehicles, Operation Safe School CD's contain information invaluable during a critical incident, immediately familiarizing deputies with the campus layout and providing pre-determined staging areas and surveillance perimeter locations. This same data will be useful in other circumstances such as in-progress intrusions during non-school hours or any event when building layouts or contacts are quickly needed.

The CD's are updated annually with new aerial photos and updated layout changes due to additions or other construction. In Weston every Principal is contacted personally to discuss the emergency plans that the Broward County School Board has in place for the district.

Hurricane Expense Update City Reimbursed for Majority of Cleanup Costs

Cleanup operations due to Hurricane Wilma and subsequent repairs, along with replacement of signage and lighting, cost the City of Weston over \$16 million. In the February 2006 edition of the Announcer, in an article entitled Hurricane Wilma Cleanup - Costly Consequences, we advised residents that the City could submit for reimbursement of cleanup expenses, as long as they were properly documented, to the following agencies:

- FEMA: for reimbursement of 75% of total eligible costs submitted.
- The State of Florida: for reimbursement of 12.5% of total eligible costs submitted to FEMA.
- The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): for reimbursement of 100% of costs submitted for clean-up and sign replacement involving FHWA designated roadways (Royal Palm Boulevard/Glades Parkway, Saddle Club Road, Indian Trace, South Post Road, Bonaventure Boulevard, Manatee Isles Drive and Weston Road).
- The City's insurance carrier: for reimbursement of eligible costs, after deductibles, for repair of damage to City structures. Landscaping is not a covered expense.

Which constitutes the un-reimbursable costs for righting & staking trees, stump grinding, deductibles and the 12.5% city portion of costs not reimbursed by FEMA or the State.

Weston was able to pay for these expenses utilizing reserve funds accrued over the past nine years. The 2007 Budget continues to fund a reserve account, and additionally, for the first time has established an Emergency Management Fund to enable the expenditure of funds to initiate the preparation or and response to any events that would prompt the declaration of a State of Emergency in the City.

During cleanup efforts, almost 8,000 trees were removed, and the City was able to save an additional 4,000 trees by bracing them. The cost for bracing and ultimately saving these 4,000 trees is not a reimbursable expense. Neither is the cost of replacing the lost landscaping. The City's approved Master Re-Landscaping Plan will begin in 2007, with the first year's cost included in the approved 2007 Budget. This 3-year re-landscaping project, which has been detailed in prior newsletters, will cost \$8 million, none of which is reimbursable. Congratulations go out to the City's Community Services Department on their professionalism and concerted efforts to provide precise documentation on cleanup efforts, which ultimately resulted in the City's reimbursement of over \$13 million in expenses.



Road Closures - December 10th

 The west bound lanes of Vista Park Blvd. from Bonaventure Blvd. to the finish line will be closed to traffic from 6:00 am - 10:00 am.

- The east bound lanes of Vista Park Blvd. from Bonaventure Blvd. to the finish line will be designated for two-way traffic from 6:00 am 10:00 am.
- Both the north bound and south bound lanes of Bonaventure Blvd. from South Post Road to Royal Palm Blvd. will be closed to traffic from 6:00 am 10:00 am.

Runners will occupy one lane on the remainder of the race courses with one lane reserved for vehicular traffic. 

The best advice of all is to always be aware, to remove the opportunity for crime in everyday life, and to be extra alert during the holiday season.

Be sure to go over these tips with teenagers and caregivers.

• This may sound simple, but when parking your vehicle to go shopping, remember where you parked! During the holidays we often shop in unfamiliar locations. Always park in a well lit and well traveled area. Do not park in a remote dark area.

- When returning to your vehicle, scan the interior of your car to be sure no one is hiding inside. Check to see if you are being followed.
- Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle.
- When storing items purchased at the stores, place them out of sight. The best place is in a locked trunk.
- NEVER leave your purse, wallet, or cellular telephone in plain view.
- Don't resist if someone tries to take any of your belongings. Don't chase someone who robs you, they may have a weapon. Instead, call 911!
- Lock your vehicle and put up your windows even while driving.
- If you go to an automatic teller machine for cash, check for people around and make sure it is well lit and in a safe location.
- Carry only the credit cards you need and avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Drive defensively. Traffic is heavier during the holidays. Drivers may also have indulged too heavily in holiday spirits. Stay safe!





It is estimated that this year, fires occurring during the holiday season will injure 2,600 people and cause over \$930 million in damage. Don't let your family be a part of this statistic.

Simple precautions can greatly reduce your chances of becoming a holiday fire casualty:

- Purchasing a holiday tree: Needles should be green and hard to pull back from the branches; trunk should be sticky to the touch.
- Keep trees away from any heat source which will dry it out faster; keep stand filled with water.
- First inspect holiday lights for frayed wires, bare spots, broken sockets or excessive kinking.
- Do not link up more than 3 light strands. Check wires periodically they should not be warm to the touch. Never place lit candles on a tree.
- Use only non-flammable metallic trees and decorations
- Never put wrapping paper or tree branches or needles in a fireplace. Burning wrapping paper can produce a chemical buildup in the home which can cause an explosion.
- Never leave holiday lights on unattended.
- Candles currently very popular, they are also dangerous. Ensure they are in stable holders and place where they cannot be knocked over or touch fabrics or other items. NEVER leave the house with candles burning.

ALWAYS have working smoke detectors on every level of your home, test monthly and equip them with fresh batteries.

Weston Graduates First CERT Class

What would you do in the event of a disaster? Would you be able to take care of yourself and your family? Would you be able to assist your neighbors until help arrived? That is exactly what some residents of Weston have prepared for. Ten residents recently completed the Community Emergency Response Team training program offered by the Broward Sheriff's Office Division of Fire Rescue. Better known as C.E.R.T., this program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.

People who go through C.E.R.T. training have a better understanding of the potential threats to their home,

workplace and community and can take the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards on themselves, their homes or workplace. If a disaster happens that overwhelms local response capability, C.E.R.T. members can apply the training learned in the classroom and during exercises to give critical support to their family, loved ones, neighbors or associates in their immediate area until help arrives. When help does arrive, C.E.R.T.s provide useful information to responders and supporttheirefforts, as directed, at the disaster site. C.E.R.T. members can also assist with non-emergency projects that improve the safety of the community. C.E.R.T.s have been used to distribute and/or install smoke alarms, replace smoke alarm batteries in the home of elderly, distribute disaster education material, provide services

at special events, such as parades, sporting events, concerts and more.

There are currently 1100 C.E.R.T teams throughout the United States with over 160 teams in the State Of Florida. The Weston C.E.R.T. team, led by Captain Jeff Andrews of the Broward Sheriff's Office, completed 24 hours of training in the areas of building construction, fire suppression, first aid, terrorism response, disaster psychology and disaster preparedness. One of the highlights of the class was utilizing different types of fire extinguishers on actual fires. They continue to meet at Fire Station No. 81 on a monthly basis in order to keep up with their training and learn new skills. Team members are currently completing the American Heart

Association CPR class and future plans include attending the State Conference in March of 2007 and participating in the Broward Region Disaster Drill in May.
